FOUND GUILTY

Dreyfus Convicted by the Court.

Sentenced to Ten Years Imprisonment.

Great Excitement and Indignation Prevails in France.

RENNES, Sept. 9.—Dreyfus was this morning convicted by the court-martial and sentenced to 10 years' imprisonment.

RENNES, Sept. 9.—At this morning's session of the Dreyfus court-martial, extraordinary precautions for the prevention of an outbreak had been taken. Detachments of police and military were stationed both inside and outside the Lycee. Every person entering the building was obliged to submit to a search for concealed arms.

The judges re-entered the court room at 3 p. m. Major Carriere made a short speech, concluding with asking for imposition of the verdict and punishment of 1894. Demange replied with a few words and then Dreyfus said hoarsely: "I affirm that I am innocent." The prisoner added that he had lived for his own honor and the honor of his wife and children, and after five years of frightful torture he was convinced that at last he would receive justice.

Col. Journaite read the judgment which opened with the question referred to the judges by the court of cassation: "Was Dreyfus guilty of entering into machinations to send secret documents to a foreign power. He gave answer that the court by a majority of five to two found Dreyfus guilty."

He concluded by saying that the court would remain sitting until the room was cleared. He asked the audience to go out quickly, and not raise a shout of any sort.

Gentlemen then closed around the audience and pressed them outside. No word was raised by any one. Judgment was read to Dreyfus by the clerk of the court. Dreyfus listened impassive, did not

Said to Be Cooling Down.

Situation Wears a More Peaceful Look.

The Queen is Opposed to Fighting the Boers.

PRETORIA, Sept. 9.—The News today prints an official statement from the secretary of state of the South African republic, in which he says: "Three courses are disclosed by communications from the British secretary of state for the colonies. "First is a commission of inquiry; second is a commission of delegates from both governments to discuss the technicalities, and the third is a conference in Cape Town.

The Secretary adds that the Transvaal government agrees to the second proposition and invited Great Britain to define the constitution commission and suggest a place of meeting.

LONDON, Sept. 9.—The Anglo-Transvaal situation wears today a more peaceful aspect. The Associated Press account of the decisions taken at the cabinet council yesterday Friday, are confirmed from the best sources of information.

In addition to the troops from India, a brigade of four battalions of infantry is under orders to start from South Africa immediately, one from home and three from Mediterranean stations. The sailing of the Castle liner Harriech Castle has been cancelled, and the steamer will probably be employed to transport British troops.

A semi-official statement comes from Pretoria, through Cape Town, to the effect that the Transvaal government has explained to the British diplomatic agent, Conyngham Green, that its last dispatch was meant as an acceptance of the proposed joint inquiry into the franchise question. It appears that the negotiations had become so involved that the Transvaal government itself had become confused, or perhaps, for its own purposes, wished to appear so.

LONDON, Sept. 9.—Montague White, the const-general of the South African Republic in London, said to a representative of the Associated Press last evening: "I assure you on the authority of a cabinet minister that there will be no war with the Transvaal. In fact, the queen will not permit war. I received a telegram from Pretoria assuring me that the Transvaal government quite understands the position regarding the peace party in England, and is in no wise misled by speeches or demonstrations."

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—A dispatch to the Tribune from London says: Reports that 10,000 troops will be moved immediately from India to Natal, are premature, but the situation is critical without doubt. The consensus of opinion in London is that a close approach [will be made to war, and such a catastrophe will be prevented in the end by the intervention of the Cape ministers and the retreat of Kruger, who is cautious enough to keep a bridge open in his rear. Kruger's forces are ordinarily set down as 20,000.

SPORTSMEN ACTIVE

Marion County Rod and Gun Club Pays Reward.

About to Import a Lot of Black Spotted Trout for Oregon Streams.

The Union County Rod and Gun Club is actively at work in the enforcement of the law for protecting game and fish, and will hold a special meeting next Tuesday evening. At that time arrangements will be perfected for receiving a consignment of young black and speckled trout from the United States fish commissioner. Word has been received that the government's fish car would reach Salem within sixty days for the delivery of the same, and the club is requested to have pure fresh water ready to transfer them to immediately on arrival. The club members feel pleased at being able to secure a start of these magnificent game fish, and will take steps to protect them. The club has paid Constable D. C. Minto, \$25 reward for the conviction of Mr. Bass for shooting China pheasants, and stands ready to pay a similar reward for any other similar convictions.

FROM SAMOA.

The People are in a State of Uncertainty.

Want to Elect Another King—Dislike Foreign Judges in Their Provinces.

By Associated Press to the Journal. VANCORVER, B. C. Sept. 9.—Advice from Samoa are that, pending the final decision of the three powers, the Samoans are in a state of uncertainty. The commission informed the Samoans before leaving that the Berlin treaty is still in existence; so is the office of chief justice. The natives claim that if the Berlin treaty is still in force then they have autonomy, and will proceed to elect a supreme chief, avoiding the title of king.

This is in contravention to the recommendation of the commission. These same people take exception to control being in the hands of a foreign governor. They also object to having foreign judges adjudicate upon matters concerning Samoans. They dislike foreign judges visiting their provinces to try cases between foreigners and themselves, and assert they can do this themselves. It is stated that an attempt will be made to upset the recommendation of the commission.

EIGHT MORE

Rebels are Captured by Americans.

Censor Still Suppressing the Truth.

Cabinet Considering Government for Philippines.

By Associated Press to the Journal. MANILA, Sept. 3.—A force of 450 rebels with one cannon attacked Santa Rita early this morning and simultaneously Tinigua and San Antonio were attacked by bodies numbering about 60 men.

All the insurgents were repulsed, no loss to the Americans. Col. Bell's regiment, while attempting to take rebels in the rear met two small patrols and succeeded in capturing a rebel captain, lieutenant and six privates.

MANILA, via Hong Kong, Sept. 9.—The censor refused to allow the following dispatch, the accuracy of which is unquestioned, to be telegraphed: The surgeons reports in regard to the condition of Mac Arthur's division show that 36 per cent of the officers and 25 1/2 per cent of the enlisted men are sick. This includes the sick in quarters and those sent home.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 9.—Minnesota and South Dakota volunteers were given a royal reception as they marched from the transport Sheridan to the presidio this morning. The general health of the troops is good, but all show signs of hard campaigning.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—The cabinet meeting yesterday was devoted almost entirely to a discussion of the local government which will be established in the Philippines on the cessation of host-

ilities. Secretary Root has given the matter much thought, and his views, as expressed at the meeting yesterday, were received with approval by all the members present. He pointed out that a system of government which would be suited to the people of Luzon would hardly do for some of the other islands, where the inhabitants were far less advanced.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—General Otis has been instructed in framing the plan of campaign for the dry season to allow for the fullest participation of the naval forces now in the Philippines and necessary orders will go forward to naval commanders to co-operate with the army to an extent not before contemplated.

Policeman Shot.

TACOMA, Sept. 9.—Police Officer Jack Martin was shot through the shoulder this morning by a man named Moore, whom he attempted to arrest as a suspicious character. The policeman shot Moore through the lungs. Moore is expected to die. Martin will recover.
