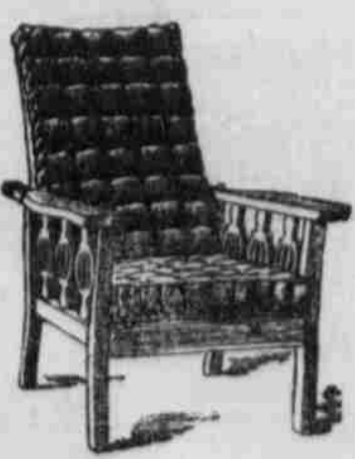

House Proceedings. By Associated Press to the Journal. WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—The house galleries were almost as crowded as yesterday, debate on the Roberts case being the attraction. After reading the journal was concluded, the president's message was read. Members listened attentively to the reading.

Finance Bill. It is probable that the debate on the financial bill in the house will not commence until next week. The Republican caucus tonight will consider the bill as framed by the caucus committee.

Insular Affairs. Tawny of Minnesota introduced in the house a resolution for the creation of a committee of seventeen to have jurisdiction over "affairs concerning the insular territory acquired or occupied under treaty with Spain."

SOUTH AFRICAN WAR

It Is Still Dragging Along With the Boers Holding the Forts

The Cable Has Been Repaired and There Ought to Be Some News of a Definite Character Soon // Heavy Bombardment By the Boers Continues While the Response From the British Garrison is Lifeless // Cronjé Holds Mafeking

Heavy Casualties. By Associated Press to the Journal. NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—A dispatch to the Herald from Pietermaritzburg says that the latest dispatches from Ladysmith says that from the beginning of the investment up to Nov. 25, there were 832 killed and wounded, including military and civilians.

London, Dec. 5.—Although repairing of the cable between Aden and Zanzibar has restored the route to South Africa and relieved quite a budget of belated dispatches, there is no new light on Buller's preparation for the relief of Ladysmith, or the movements of the other British columns.

M'KINLEY'S MESSAGE

Demands the Gold Standard in Order to Maintain the Present Parity

Insists on American Sovereignty Over the Philippines // Seeks government for Cuba // We Might Have Intervened to prevent War in South Africa if Great Britain Had Desired Our Good Offices // An Able Message

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5.—President McKinley today sent his annual message to congress. The following is a synopsis. The president begins his message with an announcement of the death of Vice-President Hobart whom he eulogizes in the highest terms.
