THE HOP MARKET.

Reports From Eastern and Foreign Markets.

Waterville Market.

There has been considerable more buying the past week than those immediately preceding. Among the late sales are: Charles H. Curtis, Waterville, 239 bales '08 at a little less than 6c. D. P. Welch 55 at about 9c, Nelson Day 23 at 8c, Jerome Hale estate 45 at 8c, Robert Davis 52 at 9c, W. Collins 21 at 10c. One buyer reports about 75 bales at from 10 to 10 1/2c.

New York Market.

N. Y. Journal, Bulletin Dec. 22: Fairly liberal buying of new crop California hops was again reported, and the stock from the state is seemingly more satisfactory than Oregon's, Washington or New York state, since the proportion of moldy and poorly picked hops is much less than in the other quarters. Prices were fairly firm for choice quality goods, but showed no quotable change. Dealers report merely fair business with brewers and a continued light run of orders from exporters. The domestic receipts and exports and imports (foreign) of hops at New York compare as follows:

SUSAN B SPEAKS HER MIND.

More Charity for a Mormon Than for a Christian Libertine.

Susan B Anthony spoke her mind recently, when discussing the interpretation put upon her speech on the Roberts question, delivered before the Women's Federation at Rochester, N. Y., a few weeks since.

"Men all over the country," said she, addressing the Per Grandis Club, at Detroit, Mich., "have taken what I said to mean that I had a soft spot in my heart for Mormonism, which, of course, is not so."

"When that petition to congress was brought in for signatures I saw sitting in front of me hundreds of society women, who knew perfectly well that they were all the time inviting men to their homes whom they knew to be libertines. I just wanted to give them a second brush. So I said that women who did not demand a strict standard of morality from men they met in their homes had no business going out to Utah to hunt down a poor Mormon, who had been educated all his life to think that polygamy was a part of his religion."

"Mormonism is a—Miss Anthony hesitated and looked around her—"we are all women together, so I will tell you just what I think. It is a damnable doctrine in the highest sense. But I have more charity for a Mormon who lapses into polygamy than I have for a so-called Christian who is a libertine. He is a thousand times worse, for he does what he has all his life been taught was a deadly sin, while the Mormon is only doing what he has been taught."
