SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 6.—Great interest is manifested in the election in western Washington. In Seattle the excitement is at fever heat. Splendid weather and popular interest will turn out an immense vote.

LONDON BROKERS GETTING READY To Take Advantage of the Boom

In Speculative Stocks—Which Is Certain to Take Place in Case McKinley Is Re-elected to the Presidency.

New York, Nov. 6.—A good many brokerage houses have arranged to have their staffs on duty all night tonight in their uptown branches or in temporary offices in that part of the city for the accommodation of customers who may desire to trade in the London market on ascertaining the result of the election for president.

The New York Stock Exchange does not open until 10 o'clock on Wednesday morning while the London exchange opens at 11 o'clock or at 6 o'clock New York time and trading on the "cable" by London brokers will begin as early as 3 o'clock New York time by which hour the result of the Presidential contest should be known.

Not a few brokerage houses it is said have already a considerable number of conditional buying and selling orders on hand to be executed in the early hours of tomorrow morning according to the outcome of the election and they expect to book many more orders from customers who will gather late this evening in their offices up town where the progress of the court in the various states will be regarded by "special wire" service.

Stock Brokers of Chicago Ready. CHICAGO, Nov. 6.—Chicago's stock brokers will follow the example of the New York speculators and keep the doors open all night. They are ready to take advantage of the result of the election by making deals at the opening of the London stock exchange at 4 a. m. Chicago time.

"The chances for the coup may not materialize," remarked a broker, "for Englishmen may take as close pains to secure early information as the Americans."

Shooting by the deputies became general. Deputy sheriff Branford, colored, was killed; Detective Garberry and deputies Harvey and Hardman, both colored, were shot. Special policeman Green was shot in the back. None of them are fatally wounded. One policeman was killed and three injured this morning in a fight at the polls in some place in the lower part of the city.

The Town of Avon, Mass., Shows a Remarkable Gain For Bryan

McKINLEY FALLS OFF SIXTY-THREE AND BRYAN GAINS FIFTY-FIVE VOTES

A Total Net Gain For the Democratic Candidate of One Hundred and Eighteen in One New England Precinct

JAPANESE AND CHINESE VOTERS

By Associated Press to the Journal. VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 6.—Five thousand Japanese and Chinese who have been naturalized during the last year may vote at the Dominion election in British Columbia on December 7. The Conservatives of Vancouver have obtained legal opinions that Japanese are all entitled to vote just as soon as their naturalization papers are made out.

A telegram received from David Mills, Canadian Minister of Justice, admits the general contention that the Japanese may vote, but suggests that the election returning officers in each case take competent legal advice in their own localities and act upon it.
