

**TOO FAST A PACE.**

(Editorial in the New Hampshire Patriot, Dem.)  
The following extract has run through the Republican exchanges of the country and may be with perfect safety be credited to any or all of them.

If you have read it once, it will not hurt you to read it again and you might, as a matter of fact read it many more times without injury:

"The Fifty-seventh congress has cost the country something over a billion dollars—that is, during the two sessions our national legislators have authorized the expenditure of that vast sum of money. he total of the session just closed is placed at \$753,484,018, against \$800,824,496 at the first session, making an aggregate for the congress of \$1,554,198,514. These figures include the permanent annual appropriations, which amount to upwards of \$132,000,000.

"According to a statement made by Senator Allison of the appropriations committee the amounts carried by the several appropriation bills are as follows:

"The total for the entire congress is something more than \$100,000,000 in excess of the total appropriations of the Fifty-sixth congress, which amounted to \$1,440,480,438. A billion and a half is a big amount of money, but this is a big country and the American people are not inclined to be penurious in the spending of their funds if the money goes toward the development and upbuilding of their country and is judiciously expended."

Doubtless, in the main, the above article was prepared by some bureau, and sent out to the Republican press of the country, with the view of breaking the news gently and reserving the opportunity, to say at the close "but this is a big country, and the American people are not inclined to be penurious in the spending of their funds if the money goes toward the development and upbuilding of their country, and is judiciously and honestly expended."

What guarantee have the American people that this money, this one thousand five hundred and fifty-four millions of dollars has been judiciously and honestly expended? What intelligent voter is there in the nation who will for a minute believe that a large percent of it was not absolutely wasted? It is true that we have a big country, but its size is not due to extravagance in public places, and its greatness will not be perpetuated by any such course.

History reveals some curious things and one of them is that the republics of the past went down because of the extravagance and corruption in public offices; because of the giving away of the funds of the people; because of over taxation; because the machinery of the government became top heavy; because the politicians usurped all rights that formerly belonged to those who made power possible for them.

There is an old saying that "Experience is a dear school, but that fools will learn in no other," and there is a wonderful amount of truth in it. It seems as though we all had to put a hand in the fire before we learned that fire burns; we have to put our fingers into the wound, before we will believe that injury has been done. We have to pay the price that folly demands; it has been so all through the ages; it is so today and in all probability it will continue so until man becomes immeasurably more thoughtful.

Of one thing we may rest assured, and that is, that as long as people consent to this monumental extravagance in public places, by keeping in power the men and the party who practice it, just so long will those men and that party live up to their expectations, in voting away their funds.

We are running a fast race; running too fast for a big country to run; great things should move slowly. It may look a little pessimistic to say we can hardly keep it up, but in the face of being even thus charged, we say there are many doubts attached to the chances we are taking.
