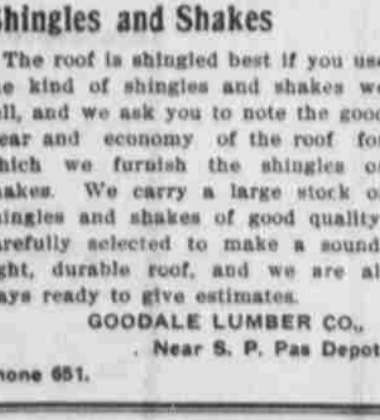

The Message From Finland

There is a tragic significance in the cable message from Dr. Kloppsch and his traveling companion. It is the first message they have sent from Swedish territory, but it deals mainly with the famine in Finland. They have traveled many hundreds of miles in sledges across the bleak, snowy wastes, in a temperature far below zero, and have visited practically every center of want and suffering in Northeastern Finland. Their experience forces them to the conclusion that the famine, far from being under control is increasing in intensity, and that the worst is yet to come.

Nothing can exceed the pathos of the description of famine conditions, as Dr. Kloppsch found them. Hundreds of little children begging bread from house to house, ragged and shoeless, in the arctic midwinter! Fever on every hand, in the lone Finnish villages, laying low the weakest and strongest. Eight hundred dead in a single district. In another, five thousand living on tree bark and spoiled rye, ever since last October. One hundred thousand men, women and children, foodless, and wholly dependent on charity. A picture to shock Europe, and to excite the sympathies of the whole world!

This cable message makes it quite clear that America's work of rescue in Finland is not yet finished. Not until the permanent relief promised by Russia actually arrives, should our energies in behalf of the patient, uncomplaining Finnish peasants be relaxed. Now that the relief work is so

thoroughly organized that it reaches to every center of suffering, the task of sustaining the lives and hopes of the stricken, until the spring thaws are past, will be greatly simplified. It needs only the generous co-operation of God's people, here and elsewhere, to make the rescue complete.

MORE EASTER STYLES

Maud Griffin's Ideas on Spring Novelties

New York, April 4.—There was never a time when the use of ribbons were greater and more varied than now. In no detail of dress does it find more subtle expression than in sashes. One of Dame Fashion's whims just now is to start the sash at the shoulder and let it fall Wayyeauwise over the skirt, heading it with natty Alsatian or other perky bows. Another pretty arrangement of the sash is to have it depended from a close fitting girdle and alternately shirred and tied in careless knots from the belt to the hem of the skirt.

Persian and Dresden ribbons make very dainty and effective sashes, but following the craze for elaboration many imported costumes have sashes trimmed with ruffles of chiffon or embroidered in exquisitely delicate designs.

There is a great demand for soft liberty satin frocks just now. White and pastel tints are chosen for afternoon, evening and house wear, but the delft blues, reseda, light peach, cornflower blue and perverche tints are charming for street wear. Many of these gowns are trimmed with black and gold, an influence which is said to have come to us from the recent durbar in India. For the women who must needs include a black gown in her wardrobe nothing could be handsomer than a black Chantilly mounted upon gold tissue, with a tiny edge of gold on all the lace flounces and frill.

A distinguishing feature of the bodice is the sleeve, which is cut in one piece from shoulder to hand on the inside of the arm. The back takes a long wing shape at it descends and stops abruptly at the elbow, where lace ruffles and puffs continue to the wrist.

The greatest variety is displayed in sleeves this season which is most consoiling for the woman who wishes to dress well on a little amount, for an exceptional opportunity for making over last season's creations is presented. The greatest care, however, must be exercised in their making. Indeed it requires a master hand for the season's best designs. However cheap the fabric may be it should be made well for a pleasing ensemble atones fully for inferiority of material when not even cloth of gold can make up for a bungled effect or lack of originality in a costume.
