

## A Fatal Fire In Pittsburg

Pittsburg, June 3.—A fire, caused by the explosion of chemicals in the drug house of the Gilmore Company, this morning, seriously burned seven. One girl, panic-stricken, jumped from the fifth story, and was fatally injured.

## For Five Days Without Food

## Steamship Aroquiah Wrecked

### In a Gale Near Valparaiso, Chili, Tuesday

### PASSENGERS AND CREW 80 IN ALL ARE DROWNED

#### Several Vessels and Scores of Small Boats Were Wrecked in the Harbor

London, June 3.—Lloyds today received a dispatch from Valparaiso reporting the loss of the Pacific Steam Navigation Company's steamer Aroquiah, with 80 aboard, including passengers and crew. The dispatch adds that several large and scores of small boats, were wrecked in the harbor during the gale of the last two days, and the city of Valparaiso suffered considerable damage.

Captain Tod, of the Aroquiah, attempted to run the steamer out to sea in a lull. She was struck by a heavy blast broadside on, and foundered. So far as known none were saved. Other ships were wrecked, including the British ship Foydale, the German bark Persimmon and the Chilean bark Esquito. The Foydale struck the breakwater, and six of the crew and the captain's wife and son were drowned. The Persimmon's crew was saved, but the Esquito lost two of her crew.

Valparaiso, June 3.—Seventeen survivors from the wreck of the Aroquiah have been rescued.

#### Brokers Arrested.

Chicago, June 3.—A large number of prominent board of trade brokerage firms appeared in court this morning and gave bonds. They are accused of conducting bucket shops in the warrants sworn out last evening. This is supposed to be in retaliation for the raid made on Red Letter Sullivan last week.

#### Battleship Contracts.

Washington, June 3.—Bids were opened today for the construction of three 16,000-ton battleships, authorized by the last appropriation. The three lowest were the Newport News Co. for \$4,110,000; the New York Shipbuilding Co., of Camden, \$4,105,000; the Fore River Co., of Quincy, Mass., \$4,179,000. All call for 42 months' time to finish them.

#### Maine Train Wrecked.

August, Me., June 3.—An excursion train is reported wrecked near Sumpter, on the coast line, and many killed and injured.

## St. Louis is Getting In the Swim

### Water Above the Danger Line and More Coming

### CREST OF THE FLOOD NOT DUE FOR TWO DAYS

#### Situation in Kansas Improving—The Rivers are Falling and the Vast Damage Showing Up

St. Louis, June 3.—The river is two feet above the danger mark, at 10 o'clock this morning, having reached the 32-foot mark. As the crest of the flood is two days' distant now, it is certain vast damage will be done. Carondelet is already suffering. Many families were removed from their homes this morning in boats. The great cradle used in transferring cars to the ferry boats was swept away this morning.

Topeka, Kan., June 3.—The Kaw river fell 40 inches in the 24 hours preceding six o'clock this morning. Governor Bailey now contemplates calling a special session of the legislature to provide emergency appropriations. Bullarugs continue to collapse. Two persons were rescued from the second floor of an outlying brick residence, where they had been three days with their food supply gone.

Lawrence, Kan., June 3.—The river fell three feet last night.

Kansas City, Mo., June 3.—The riv-

er fell six-tenths of a foot during the night, though a light rain continues. A partial street car system is in operation this morning. No further loss of life from the flood in this section is expected. Boats are running to Kansas City, Kansas, conveying food and necessities. The only boats in the flooded district are in charge of the police, as there are more than two and a quarter million dollars under water in the safes of the smaller banks, express companies and railway offices.

The steamers last night brought in 67 passengers from the Randolph & (Continued on page five.)

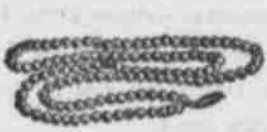
