TELLS HIS OWN STORY

Boy of Sixteen Looking for His Parents

Tells of a Strenuous Life, in Philippines and China and of Numerous Battles and Wounds

I was born in Mayaville, January 20, 1887, remained at home until July 14, 1898, when I ran away and tried to go war, as a mascot; but they would not let me. I went to Ottawa, Kansas, and remained there until Company K, 20th Kansas Volunteers started for San Francisco, and they let me go that far, then they stowed me in the hull of the ship, and September 2d we started for Manila. Our first battle was at Colocan, where I was wounded in the right side, while after water. Our next battle was at Mololias, and again I was wounded in the right arm, and went to the hospital. Had just gotten out, when we were ordered to scout along the Bag Bag river, where we destroyed two towns, and many huts. When we advanced on Malabon, the Philippine capital, I was wounded again in the left limb, above the knee, and twice in the right limb below the knee, and my right knee cap was broken by a Mauser ball. On May 4th we advanced on San Fernando, but the battle was fought the 3d, and we were too late, and I was in several other battles, but I was not again wounded. The company was ordered home December 9th, and I remained with the Ninth Infantry, Company C, under Capt. Conners, and went with him to China, where I was in only two battles, at Tein Tein and Pekin. In Tein Tein I was wounded in the left breast and in the left arm, and in Pekin I lost my hearing and speech by a ball entering my chin and coming out behind my left ear. I was also in the massacre of Samar Island, when my company was butchered up September 27, 1901, and I escaped with five bolo cuts to return home, to find that my parents, upon hearing I was killed, had moved, and left no trace behind them. I am now searching for them. Being a mascot, and not on the pay roll, I can not get a pension. FRED L. HOWE, JR.
