AUTO CAUSES TROUBLE

Starts Runaway in Which Horse is Killed

This Runaway Starts Another and the Deaf Mute School Carriage was Wrecked

Yesterday afternoon, while Gustavo Mitzler, a German farmer from Marion, was driving out of the city on his way home, and while on the country road beyond the penitentiary, near the Aufrance home, an automobile, passing him at full speed, frightened his horse, causing him to run away, and, before he could be caught, he fell dead on the road.

Mr. Mitzler and his son, in a buggy were driving along the road, where it is narrow and graded up high, when, on nearing a bend in the road, they met the automobile, coming at a rate of from 15 to 20 miles an hour. Motioning frantically to the chauffeur to stop the machine, Mr. Mitzler drew his horse to the side of the road, and went to the animal's head to better control him, but the auto came on at full speed, and whizzed by. This so frightened the horse that he plunged and ran away, trampling on Mr. Mitzler, and dashing down the road. He ran for a half mile, to where a crowd on the highway interfered with his further progress, when he turned in an effort to retrace his steps, but fell in the roadway, and in five minutes had expired, having sustained some injury in the fall.

Mr. Mitzler valued his horse at \$150, and this, together with damage sustained by his buggy, is a serious loss. Further damage was done by the fact that a team belonging to the deaf mute school was frightened by the runaway, and the carriage to which the team was attached was badly wrecked by the frightened animals, before they could be controlled.

Mr. Mitzler came to town during the afternoon and swore out a warrant for the chauffeur, charging him with grossly injuring the personal property of another. The name of the driver of the auto was not known, and it was found difficult to arrest the right man. It was supposed to be Ed. McCallahan, of Portland, but that gentleman proved beyond question that he had not been on the penitentiary road during the day, and he was not molested. He went south this morning on business at points up the valley.

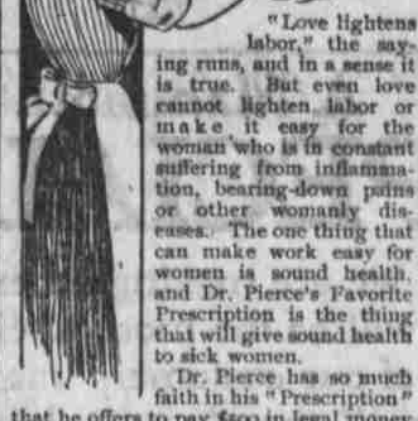

Nahant, Mass., July 13.—Nahant awoke this morning to find herself dressed in holiday attire and otherwise prepared for a great jollification in celebration of her fiftieth birthday. Fifty guns at sunrise disturbed the slumbers of the late risers and soon every citizen of the town, from the humble fisherman to the millionaire summer resident, was taking part in the general festivities.
