**SESSION  
 OF THE  
 PREACHERS**

**Methodist Conference  
 Met in This City  
 This Morning**

**Pastors Warned They Must  
 File Their Reports Before  
 Leaving Appointments**

The Oregon conference of the Methodist Episcopal church convened at the First M. E. church in this city this morning, with an attendance of about 100 ministers, and as many lay delegates present. Bishop J. W. Hamilton called the convention to order, and Rev. C. A. Lewis, of Sellwood, was appointed conference secretary, while C. E. Cline was named as press committee.

After the sacrament of the Lord's Supper had been administered, the conference opened its business session. Dr. Mains, of New York, agent of the Methodist Book Concern, was introduced, and addressed the conference briefly on the splendid history of that concern, showing that in 114 years it had never failed to meet a matured obligation, and he detailed the wonderful advance made in the history of the book concern, starting from a small beginning, and increasing until it was one of the great business institutions of the twentieth century.

Rev. W. D. Parr, D. D., agent of the Church Extension Society, addressed the conference briefly, showing the condition of that society, and urging the ministers of the conference to exert themselves next year in aiding the extension work. He expressed his surprise at the wonderful resources of the Pacific Northwest, and predicted a glorious future for this country, in which, he stated, Methodism would have a great part.

Bishop Hamilton, a most forcible speaker, urged the ministers to make their reports promptly to the statistical secretary, so that all reports could be promptly tabulated, and he warned all that ministers who failed to make required reports, could secure no appointments for next year.

After the disposal of the business of the forenoon session, a special meeting was announced for 2 o'clock this afternoon, when statistical reports will be received.

The most important business of the convention will be the looking after the future of Willamette University, and the election of four delegates, two ministers and two laymen, to attend the general conference of the church, at Los Angeles, next May.
