## Battles That Will Be Fought at the Primaries

### Warm Contest Ahead in the Bloody Fourth at Salem and in the Stronghold of French Prairie

The political fight at Woodburn is always a matter of interest to the whole county. The primaries there and in the bloody fourth ward at Salem will be the centers where the battle will wage the fiercest, and the dead and dying will lie thickest on the ground, after the ballots are deposited on Monday. In all other parts of the county there is peace and harmony. In the fourth ward it is reported that the Hughes slate is not in favor, in fact the makers of that slate are offering to take names from the other slate. At the last moment the Hughes slate is to take about half the Walt Low slate, and fill it out with Hughes men, and thus try to run it in. It is not apparently a fight over any candidate in that ward, but a revolt against the bossism and domination of one man, and the outcome will be watched with interest.

**The Woodburn Fight.**  
Three elements started into the Woodburn primary fight, the usual Poorman Toose line-up, and then a so-called independent slate under the lead of Republicans dissatisfied with both of these gentlemen. Then Jack Johnson flung his castor into the ring, and took sides with Toose, and the Poorman men began talking independent ticket. So far as individual interests are now concerned the line-up may be stated as Settlement-Johnson-Toose vs. Poorman-Dose-Simon Republicans, the former ticket represents the Mitchell interests, if there be such a division, in this county. It is certain that the anti-Mitchell crowd have always managed to line up with Poorman, and the fact that Mr. Poorman is a member of the state central committee from Marion county, but is "persona non grata" with the state chairman gives color to this statement. The Regulars vs. the Independent-Simon-Poorman combination is about the way the case will stand when the voters go to the primaries. If Mr. Poorman is defeated

### Call for Congressional Convention

A convention of the Republican party of the First congressional district of the state of Oregon is hereby called to meet in Salem, Ore., Wednesday, April 13, at 11 a. m., for the purpose of nominating one representative for congress and to transact such other business as may properly come before the convention.

The convention will consist of 177 delegates, apportioned among the several counties of the district as follows, to-wit: Benton, 7; Clackamas, 18; Coos, 9; Curry, 3; Douglas, 14; Jackson, 12; Josephine, 7; Klamath, 4; Lake, 4; Lane, 19; Lincoln, 5; Linn, 14; Marion, 23; Polk, 9; Tillamook, 5; Washington, 13; Yamhill, 11. Total, 177.

The same being one delegate-at-large for each county, one for every 150 votes cast for Judge Bean on the last general election, and one for every fraction of 150 larger than 150.

That the work of the convention may be expedited as much as possible the committee suggests that the chairman and secretaries of the several county conventions certify to the list of delegates elected by their county conventions to this congressional convention and mail them at once to Curtis B. Winn, secretary congressional committee, Albany, Ore.

Delegates or others in attendance at the convention may secure a rate of one and one-third fares for the round trip on the Southern Pacific and the Corvallis & Eastern railways by paying full fare to Salem, taking a receipt for fare paid from the ticket agent and having same properly certified by the secretary of the convention.
