## PORTLAND CANOE PARTY

### Six Young Men Make a Seventy Mile Trip With Paddles

A party of six young amateur athletes left Portland on the Saturday evening local, shipped their three canoes to Albany, and followed on the train. They were Jim Ambrose, Tom West, Will Martin, Johnathan Burkhardt, Ed. Frohman and Vyvan Dent. At Albany their craft had not arrived, and they took berths in the moonlight on the river docks until the steamer pulled in about 2:30 a. m. At 7 a. m. they pulled out of the "White City" at the mouth of the Calapoia, and made the run to Salem of 33 miles by 12:30. Here a tie-up occurred, while one of the crew was dispatched to a bakery for bread, and a meal was got on the island below the Capital City. In the afternoon the canoeists pulled out, and near Butteville slept on the downy side of a sand bank, reaching Portland in safety Monday evening. The run of 70 miles was made entirely with paddles, one portage around the falls at Oregon City being the only time the canoes were out of the water. Most of the young men were experienced paddlers, and members of the Portland athletic clubs and rowing teams, taking their two-day vacation in this hearty and wholesome manner. At Salem a number of friends greeted them, and had it been known that the voyagers were coming half the town would have been there to give them a welcome.
