Reading by Artificial Light.

It is almost universally believed that the best form of reading lamp is one which, by means of an effective shade, concentrates the greater portion of the light upon the reading matter, says the "Jewelers' Weekly Circular." Further more, the lamp is usually one of the "drop light" sort, which brings the flame near and below the readers' eyes.

The result sought after is that much light be precipitated on the page, and on the page only, while the surrounding parts of the room be weakly illuminated, even to gloominess.

If this condition be obtained an ideal state of affairs is presumed to exist, and, at first, it looks very plausible, indeed, that it is usually accepted as a positive fact not to be gainsaid. But it must be refuted. The custom, though of long standing, and of almost unquestioned correctness, is a bad one, and doubly harmful because of the strong hold it has upon the public mind.

The best method of lighting artificially, when the source of light is a bright one, is to place the light considerably above the head, holding the reading matter in such a position as to be illuminated as much by the reflected light from the surrounding surfaces as from the direct rays from the flame, thus creating an effect more nearly resembling "daylight" conditions.

SENATOR ELKINS TALKS

Gives Good Reasons Why His Father-in-law Should Not Be Elected

United States Senator Stephen B. Elkins in his speech as temporary chairman of the Republican state convention of West Virginia said: "The Democratic party, in its desire to capture the state, has nominated for Vice-president one of our most distinguished citizens and the foremost Democrat in this state, but in this, as in everything else, the Democrats made a mistake. Senator Davis, to whom I am so nearly related and for whom I cherish feelings of the highest regard, admiration and affection, is a man of affairs, and an experienced statesman, having served his state creditably in the senate for 12 years. With these qualifications and this fitness he should have been named for the first place instead of a man without a record and without business or political experience."

"West Virginia cannot be gulled into giving up protection and sound money to make Judge Parker President, even if in so doing they make Senator Davis, Vice-president. I have not the slightest doubt of victory next November. There is no good reason why a Republican should change his vote on state and national politics, but many and weighty reasons why he should not."

"The Democracy of West Virginia advocates the astounding proposition, should it come into power in the state to disfranchise 15,000 loyal colored Republicans, and rob them of the rights of citizenship guaranteed by the constitution, and for which many of them and their fathers fought in the war of the Union. Republicans must and will resist this proposition, because it is not only wrong in itself, but unfair and unjust to a large body of law-abiding and industrious citizens."

"President Roosevelt has given the people a wise and pure administration that commends itself to all our people. The President has so commended himself to the people that he has been renominated without opposition, and with him for Vice-president, Charles Warren Fairbanks one of our purest, ablest, most experienced statesmen. Under the leadership of these men, with a flag of protection floating high over it, the Republican party will triumph. President Roosevelt already stands as one of the remarkable figures in our history. He walks hand in hand with destiny, and at times seemingly compels it to do his bidding. The American people will not turn away from him to risk or follow one untried man on an ambiguous, evasive and un-American platform. The Democratic platform says: 'We denounce protection as robbery of the many to enrich the few.'"
