## KILLED THEIR GAME

### Delegates From Rival Towns Have Fine Banquet

North Bend and Marshfield are rival towns down on Coos bay. They both appointed delegates to attend the meeting of the Oregon Development League, and when they arrived in Portland the former entertained the latter at a dinner.

The feature of the dinner was the venison which was provided by the marksmanship of J. R. Robertson. Last Sunday afternoon, while the members of the North Bend delegation were staging it from Marshfield to Roseburg, a young buck sprang up from a dense clump of underbrush and started to run. The animal was 60 yards away from the stage, and as no one had thought of seeing this sort of game on the trip, a rifle had not been brought. But just to show his companions what a revolver could do when held by a man who can shoot, Mr. Robertson fired at the fleeing deer. One shot was enough, for the animal dropped in its tracks, the .38-caliber bullet having gone through its body.

Frightened by the sound of the shot a grouse flew up and lit in the top of the highest near-by tree. Aiming his smoking revolver at the bird, Mr. Robertson again fired. The grouse tumbled out of the treetop dead, both grouse and venison were served at the banquet.

**Carnival Company's Attractions.**  
 The Sacramento Bee writes of the attractions with the Southern Carnival company:

The ascent of the spiral tower, one of the free attractions, held the attention of a large crowd last night. A man ascends and descends a high tower on a large ball; which he propels with his feet. When he is descending he sets off a pyrotechnic display, and finishes his journey in a rain of fire.

Immediately after the coronation ceremonies, the acrobatic attractions of the stadium were presented on the platform in front of the Queen's throne. Many acts, such as tumbling, wire walking, trapeze performing, juggling, etc., all of which were remarkable in their class, were given. The leading attraction of the stadium, however, was the "looping the loop" by Diavolo. Diavolo dressed in a suit of scarlet, was introduced to the court and then to the audience, and ascended a steep incline. He mounted his wheel, and came down the incline with terrific speed. He swung around the loop in a second. The apparatus is so constructed that when the rider passes over a certain part of it, he touches a spring, which instantly swings a portion of the track around, so that he continues his ride around an unbroken path. As soon as he completes the circuit he is stopped by ropes tied to sand bags, within a short distance of the loop.
