ADMIRAL WATSON RETIRES

Plucky Sea Fighter Quits Active Service in the Navy

Admiral Watson Retires. Washington, D. C. Aug. 24.—With the retirement today of Rear Admiral John C. Watson the navy loses one of its ablest and most honorable and useful officers. His career from the date of his graduation from the naval academy in 1860, has been full of honors and credit, and few officers of the navy have seen more active service. Admiral Watson belongs to a family that has distinguished itself in peace and war since the early days of the American republic. He was born in Frankfort, Ky., August 24, 1842. His father, Edward Howe Watson, was a skillful physician of the old school, and his mother, Sarah Lee Crittenden Watson, was a daughter of John Jordan Crittenden, the famous Kentucky statesman, rival of Henry Clay, governor at one time of Kentucky, and attorney general in William Henry Harrison's cabinet. Admiral Watson entered the naval academy in 1856 and graduated four years later, standing high in his class. He was immediately assigned to the rank of midshipman, and August 15, 1860, joined the Susquehanna in that capacity for a cruise to Europe. While he was abroad the civil war broke out and he returned at once to take part in it. He was commissioned a lieutenant in 1862, and, in January, 1864, he was made flag lieutenant to Farragut. He was in the battles of New Orleans, Mobile Bay, Vicksburg and Port Hudson. In a letter to his son Loyal, during the war, Admiral Farragut tells him of young Nelson's volunteering to slip off and blow up a blockade runner. Among other things he says: "It was an anxious night for me, as I am about as fond of Watson as I am of your own dear self." It was Admiral Watson, then a young lieutenant, who lashed Farragut to the rigging during the battle of Mobile Bay. The powerful Confederate iron clad Tennessee attacked the Hartford fiercely. Farragut took up his position in the port mizzen rigging the better to observe the fight, and to direct and cheer his men. Lieutenant Watson seeing the great danger to which the intrepid admiral was exposing himself, procured a rope and lashed his in his place. The relations which existed between Admiral Farragut and his flag lieutenant were of the most affectionate description. In his official report of the Mobile battle, Farragut showed what he thought of young Watson. "Lieutenant Watson," he wrote, "has been brought to your attention in former times. He was on the poop, attending to the signals and performing his duty as might be expected, thoroughly." During the war with Spain it was Admiral Watson, then a commodore, who was ordered to sea with a squadron to destroy Admiral Camara's fleet, which was believed to be preparing to return to Spain from the Suez canal. During the later period of the war he distinguished himself with the squadron in West Indian waters. Lately Admiral Watson has been on special duty abroad to report what is being done for the betterment of the enlisted personnel of foreign navies.

Convention of Photo Men. Boston, Mass., Aug. 24.—The leading photographers of Maine, Vermont, Massachusetts, Connecticut, and other states are in Boston for the annual convention of the New England Photographers' Association, which began a three days' session today. George E. Tingley, of Mystic, Conn., called the gathering to order this morning in the Mechanics' building. The session will be devoted to papers and discussions on recent discoveries and improvements in the art of photography.

Grand Rapids Shoot. Grand Rapids, Mich., Aug. 24.—The shooting tournament begun here today under the auspices of the local gun club bids fair to be the most notable event of the kind ever held in Michigan. A three day's program has been arranged. The professional experts taking part include William Heer, Kollo Heikes and Chauncey Powers, the national amateur champion.
