## GREATER SALEM CLUB

Has Secured a New Secretary Pro Temp

Undertaking to Promote an Extensive Movement of Broken Rock Roads

Hon. J. G. Graham, secretary of the Greater Salem Commercial Club, left today for a month's vacation in the East, visiting the cities of Chicago and New York, and incidentally calling on the immigration headquarters in the interest of the club and this part of the state.

Mr. Graham has secured the services of B. Frank Meredith as secretary pro temp, during his absence, and the club's headquarters will be at Mr. Meredith's office until Graham's return.

## The Correspondence Committee.

Work on this line, as outlined by Tom Richardson and the State Development League, will be pushed in Mr. Graham's absence. Daily meetings of the executive committee are to be held, and the formation of the committee rapidly extended. The folder recently issued by the club will be used extensively, and Mr. Graham's efforts was embodied in a four-page, illustrated write-up of Marion county and Salem in the August issue of the Northwest Empire, 100,000 copies of which were issued. A special fund will be raised for this work of direct correspondence.

## Pushing Rock Roads.

The officers of the Commercial Club are pushing a broken rock road movement that will, it is hoped, eventually in the construction of these superior roadways on a large scale. The committee, headed by Engineer H. B. Thelsen, who visited the granite quarry of the Santiam, were favorably impressed with that material, and Mr. Thelsen does not hesitate to say that he will recommend the use of the granite with other material for roads and streets. The president of the club is in correspondence with the freight departments of the Southern Pacific and the Corvallis & Eastern, and is promised a joint rate at an early date that will lay down the crushed granite in any city or at any siding in Marion or Linn counties at an almost nominal rate. Then if the local district road tax will be expended in grading up and draining the roads, and the county can buy the broken metal, and the farmers can haul it out, thus uniting the interests and public spirit of the locality, the resources of the railroad, and the backing of the county municipality, making it light for all.

## A Great Advertisement.

Broken rock roads are no longer an experiment. The people are getting to know their merits. There is no excuse for spending money on inferior material, when broken granite or trap rock can be obtained. A railway company would not buy and lay down soft iron rails nowadays, when steel rails are obtainable. Granite is the best road material known. It is believed it can be crushed and laid down at sidings and for streets of cities so cheaply that no other surface material will be in demand. Of course, this depends some on the rates made by the railroads. A nominal rate that would result in the largest possible use of granite for roadways would be in the interest of these corporations. Figures will be in the possession of the Greater Salem Commercial club that will settle the matter in the minds of the people forever. There will be no greater advertisement for Salem, and this whole valley than to have it publicly decided that granite roads were to be constructed on a large scale and that the larger powers of the community had agreed on such a policy, and had deliberately decided to carry it into effect.
