HORSES BACKED IN RIVER

J. E. Rogers, of the firm of Rogers & Rogers, at Hopewell, had as narrow an escape from losing his life last evening as probably he ever will have. While driving his spirited team along the road on top of the high bank, near Wheatland, the Oregon horse in sight, and the horses, frightened by the headlight, began to prance around, and ended by backing over the high bank at that point, and man, team and buggy were thrown into a tangled wreck into the river below. Captain Raabe, of the Oregon, heard the cry for "help," and quickly swing in the boat around, he came to the rescue, First Officer Meyers lost no time in getting his crew into action, and the half-drowned man was quickly rescued. As soon as Mr. Rogers was safe, the horses were pulled out, and all were landed, none the worse for the mishap, with the exception of the scare and the wetting, on a gravel bar about two miles up the river.

Boston Opens Her Doors.
Boston, Mass., Oct. 4.—The intellect and the power of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States are concentrated in Boston today. On every train distinguished bishops, active clergymen and influential laymen from all parts of the Union have been pouring into the city, until even the hotel corridors for once in their history might be mistaken for the vestibules of churches, so numerous throughout are men of priestly mien. At many of the aristocratic residences in the Back Bay district bishops and clergymen have found splendid quarters. The handsome home of Mrs. "Jack" Gardner is but one of a large number that has been placed at the disposal of the visiting bishops and clericals. The use of the palatial residence of Montgomery Sears by J. Pierpont Morgan and the use of the Head residence by Bishop Potter, of New York, are among the number. The Archbishop of Canterbury is being entertained as the guest of Mr. Morgan.

Talks with the prominent churchmen already here indicate that the coming convention will be full of interest and importance. Among the important topics of business to be considered and acted upon is the report of the commission which was appointed three years ago to consider the question of changing the legal name of the church, "Protestant Episcopal," and to ask the opinion of the dioceses. The commission in a report made public last spring decided against a change at this time.

The agitation for a more explicit and stricter canon on the prohibition of marriage of divorced persons, except for one cause, will also be discussed at length, and the advisability of grouping the dioceses of the country into provinces, with a primate at the head of each province, will also be considered. A proposed board of review, where appeals from the diocesan courts may be heard, the question of meeting the situation in the insular possessions and other issues will also be taken up.

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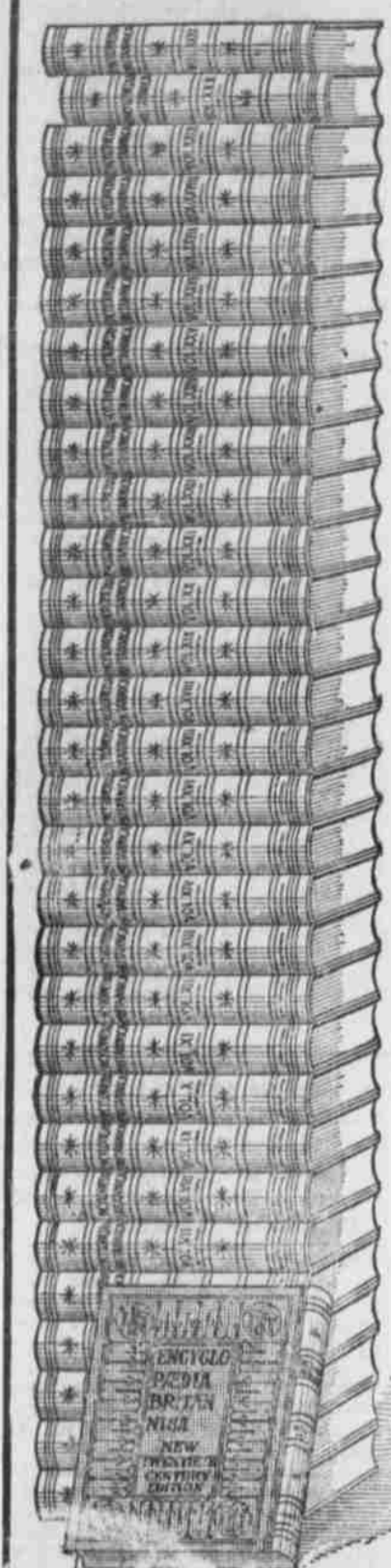
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
