GIVE ME THOSE PRESENTS

San Francisco, Oct. 5.—Engagement rings must be returned when young women decide to recall their promises to marry. So says Judge John R. Daniels, and Miss Flora Lewis, of this city, sorrowfully handed over to her ex-fiancee, R. M. Eisner, the glittering solitaire with which their love was pledged when they decided some time ago that life would hold no joy for either of them unless they could travel side by side.

Shortly after their engagement Miss Lewis came to the conclusion that she did not love Eisner sufficiently to marry him, and she so informed him.

Eisner gallantly released the lady from her promise, but demanded the return of the diamond ring which he had given her at the time of their engagement. Miss Lewis refused to give the ring up, and Mr. Eisner brought suit to compel her to do so.

The lady sought to show the court that she intended to sell the ring and give the proceeds to charity, but Judge Daniels ruled the testimony out.

In deciding the case, the judge found only three cases in legal history that would serve as a precedent. One was in Vermont, where a young man man had given his promised bride money with which to buy a trousseau. When the engagement was broken the lady refused to give up the money, but was compelled to do so by law. The other two cases were decided in the English courts, one of them a century and a half ago.

In his decision Judge Daniels said: "Eisner did not give the ring to the defendant to win her favor, but in consideration of her engagement, and to conform to a custom long in vogue in sealing the ties of an engagement with a ring. When the defendant broke the engagement the consideration failed, and the gift, conditional upon marriage, should have been returned."

Miss Lewis expresses her determination to appeal and to secure possession of the ring by carrying the case into the highest courts.

Russians Surrounded.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 5.—A dispatch states that a force of Japanese have surrounded a party of Russians who were reconnoitering at Apriel, near Mukden. The Russians cut their way out, and returned to camp with some captured convoys. The Japanese are entrenching near Foulin. The weather is very cold.

LIGHTNING STRIKES OIL

A Number of Great Refineries Are in Danger

Findlay, Ohio, Oct. 5.—Lightning this morning set fire to a tank of 1200 barrels of oil belonging to the National refinery. The intense heat caused the explosion of three nearby tanks. Other tanks and refineries are in danger. The loss will probably reach \$100,000.
