On receipt of a telegram from State Chairman Baker, the officers of the local Republican organizations are informed that Senator Mitchell will address the Republicans of Salem on Tuesday November 1st, and that date has been set for the big campaign rally in this city.

Four other speakers will be invited to attend and make addresses, as follows: State Senator Percy Kelly of Albany, State Senator Wm. Kuykendall of Eugene, State Senator Dan Malarkey of Portland, and Representative Wm. I. Vawter of Medford.

There will be a parade with two bands, in which the Roosevelt club, the Young Men's Republican club, and the First Voter's club will take part. Delegations from all over the county are expected to be in the city and a competent committee is in charge of the whole program.

The committees of the different organizations are all working harmoniously and the rally will be one of the events in the history of the Republican party of this city and county.

**INVENTS
NEW HOP
PRESS**

L. F. Evans, an Oregon boy, has invented a horse power hop press that is deserving of especial mention, as will be seen from the record made by the trial on the farm of Louis Aral, near Gervais:

The record is 90 bales put out in 8 hours and 9 minutes; the highest record 14 bales per hour; lowest record 10 bales per hour; average weight, per bale, 290 pounds; from the time the team starts until the doors fly open with a pressed bale, 8 seconds. Four men are required to run the press.

If there is any hop press in existence with a better record, Mr. Evans would like to hear from it.
