## YOUNG REPUBLICANS PERFECT ORGANIZATION

### First Voters Club Elect Officers and Prepares for Campaign Work

The First Voters' Club of Salem held its first official meeting last evening in the court room of the city hall. W. E. Richardson was elected chairman pro tem, and appointed, on motion, Walter Keys, Frank Snyder and George Bernier a committee of three on constitution, who submitted the following, which was adopted.

#### Constitution.

**Article I.**  
The name, style and title of this organization shall be the First Voters' Club of Salem, and its object shall be to maintain and inculcate Republican principles, and to promote by all honorable means the success of Republican measures and candidates at the polls.

#### Article II.

Any male Republican citizen of Salem who is to cast his first vote for President may be elected a member of this club by a majority vote at any regular meeting of the club, or of the executive committee, but no person shall be deemed a member until he shall have signed the roll of the club.

#### Article III.

1. The officers of this club shall consist of a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer, who shall be elected by ballot by a majority vote of the members present. They shall serve until their successors shall be elected and qualified, performing the duties which usually belong to their respective offices.

2. There shall be an executive committee chosen, consisting of the president, who shall be the ex-officio chairman of the club, and two members from each city ward, who shall be nominated by the members of the club representing the respective wards, and shall be confirmed by the club. The authority of the executive committee shall be determined and regulated by such rules and instructions as the club may from time to time adopt.

3. All moneys of the club shall be collected and disbursed by the treasurer, and all disbursements shall be made upon approval of the president, secretary and treasurer, who shall be a committee to audit bills against the club.

#### Article IV.

This constitution may be amended at any meeting by a three-fourths vote of the members present, but all amendments must be reduced to writing before a final vote thereon can be had.

#### By-Laws.

The order of business at meetings of the club shall be as follows:  
1. Roll call.  
2. Reading and disposing of minutes of previous meeting.  
3. Committee reports.  
4. Unfinished business.  
5. Miscellaneous business.  
6. Program and discussion.  
7. Adjournment.

**Article II.**  
The president or any five members of the executive committee, may call special meetings of the entire club or of the executive committee. The time and place of other meetings of the club may be determined by motion from time to time or by standing rule adopted at any meeting. Nine members shall constitute a quorum of the club, and five a quorum of the executive committee.

**Article III.**  
These by-laws may be amended at any time by a two-thirds vote of the members present, but any amendment shall be reduced to writing before a final vote thereon can be had.

Election of officers was next in order, and resulted in the following capable young men being unanimously selected to fill the offices:  
President, W. E. Keys.  
Secretary, Frank Snyder.  
Treasurer, P. M. Young.

On motion the election of the vice-president and the two members of the executive committee from each ward was suspended until the next meeting. Next Attorney H. Dixon Dennis was called upon to address the meeting and delivered a rousing address, in which he censured the Salem Republicans on their lack of enthusiasm, citing the reception of George Shaw as an example. He also warned the young men to be careful to avoid making the fatal mistake of becoming overconfident. He made a statement of the well-known fact that the country never before knew the prosperity that it does today, and asked why the people want for a change. He recalled the picture of despair during the Cleveland administration, and said that at the close of that term there wasn't an honest Democrat in the country that could look a sheep in the face.

Mr. Dennis also dwelt upon the inconsistency of the Democratic party in their having a multiplicity of issues. Also mentioned that the Democrats have run themselves to death in the last 50 years chasing after different issues. He then closed his address with a brilliant eulogy of Republican principles.

An announcement was made of a meeting of the executive committees of the different Republican clubs of the city of Salem, to be held at the police court room, Saturday evening, October 22d.

Col. E. Hofer was next called upon, and made a short but enthusiastic speech, well sprinkled with humor, the trend of which was the support of the politician, and advising the young voters present not to despise small things, and to take interest in ward politics, as well as the greater branches. He also made a few rousing remarks on the advancement and improvement of the city.

On motion the club adjourned until next Tuesday, October 25th.

## BARBERS BOARD REPORT

### Whisker Trimmers Have Been Trimmed in Several Places by Officials

The State Board of Barber Examiners sent the following report to Governor Chamberlain late yesterday afternoon. This report should have been made March 1st, but owing to the decision handed down by Judge George, declaring the board unconstitutional, the report was delayed until the supreme court reversed the decision. The report, condensed, is as follows:

To the Honorable Governor of the State of Oregon:  
We, your commission appointed under an act of the legislature of 1899 and amended in 1903, entitled to regulate the pursuit, business, art and avocation of a barber in the state of Oregon, owing to a decision of Judge George rendered, declaring the act unconstitutional, deferred making our report, which was due March 1, 1904, until the supreme court had passed its decision upon the act, and, having reversed Judge George, we therefore hereby submit our report from October 9, 1903, to October 7, 1904, which is as follows:

The board has visited every barber shop in the city of Portland, and has found things in a very unsatisfactory state to the board, and, after having several cases tried in the municipal court of the city of Portland for violation of the rules and regulations of the board by different barbers and the barber college, we have finally succeeded in getting things in a more satisfactory condition, and have rid the city and state of one of the great evils of the barber profession by the closing of the American Barber College, which was conducted by people inexperienced and incompetent in the instruction of the art of barbering.

Having personally inspected all the shops in the city of Portland and vicinity, the board will in the near future inspect all the shops throughout the state. Respectfully submitted,
