## CASSIE REMAINS IN JAIL

New York, Dec. 12.—Although the efforts of counsel to secure bail so far have ended in failure, Mrs. Chadwick told the keeper of the Tombs this morning that she had great hopes of securing bondsmen today. United States Marshal Henkel today received a subpoena from the United States district attorney's office, at Cleveland, which he as directed to serve at once on Andrew Carnegie, who is wanted to testify before the grand jury in the Cleveland case against Beckwith, Spear and others involved in the Chadwick case, and the deputy hurried out to search for Carnegie.

Mrs. Chadwick slept well last night and arose at 7 o'clock quite chipper and happy. After a light breakfast she was handed a telegram from Paris, presumably from her husband, Dr. Chadwick, and then she devoted her attention to this morning's papers.

Attorney Ryall, who represents Banker Newton, called at the Tombs at 10:30 o'clock, in company with Philip Carpenter, counsel for Mrs. Chadwick, and held a long conference with the prisoner. It was learned this morning that Mrs. Chadwick still favors waiving an examination, and returning to Cleveland for trial.

## NANNY IN GOOD HUMOR

New York, Dec. 12.—Wm. Stemm, Jr., was the first witness in the Patterson trial this morning. He told of seeing Young in the cab after the shot was fired. He was lying down, with his head on the woman's lap. The woman was pale and excited.

Miss Patterson dressed this morning in black as usual. She seemed in good humor today. Her counsel, Abe Levy, said that the trial would probably be completed by December 22.

## HALTER MURDER ROPE

Los Angeles, Dec. 12.—John McClure, aged 60, in a dispute over a 25-cent halter, killed J. Shea and S. Peodloff, employees of a livery stable. He shot the latter, and then Shea, the foreman, grabbed him, and a desperate conflict ensued. Shea was stabbed ten times with a dirk. The murderer gave himself up to a policeman.

**Postoffice Robbed.**  
Des Moines, Dec. 12.—The postoffice at Reinbeck, Iowa, was broken into during the night, and \$2500 taken. Several shots were exchanged between citizens and the robbers, who escaped.
