DIED ON NEW YEAR DAY

Passing Away of an Esteemed Oregon Pioneer

James Finney of Brooks Will be Buried from the St. Louis Catholic Church

James Finney, a highly respected pioneer farmer, of Brooks, died at his home Sunday, January 1, 1905, at 9:30 o'clock. He had been gradually declining since Wednesday, when he suffered a fatal stroke of paralysis. He was 76 years old, and had born up bravely under the infirmities of his old age. He leaves a wife, who is very ill, and three children, Ella and Edward, and George, who resides at Gervais. The funeral will be held from the house tomorrow at 8 a. m. Burial services at the St. Louis Catholic church at 10:30 a. m. He had been a resident of this county for 36 years, and he leaves a large property, which he accumulated by hard labor. He was a model citizen in every respect, industrious, temperate and patriotic. His hand was never closed to the poor who sought his aid. It is but a short time since his cheerful figure was seen on the streets of the Capital City, where he had many friends, and was esteemed very highly by all who had dealings with him. His spirit will rest in the peace that comes to all who lead a life of righteousness.
