FLAT SALARY BILL

Lively Skirmish Expected by Friends of the Measure

It is thought by many that an effort is being made to kill Miller's and Kay's flat salary bills in the committee, and when the friends of these bills become fully convinced that such is the case, there will occur a lively skirmish. Miller's friends assert that, unless his bill is reported by the judiciary committee either today or tomorrow, he will demand it on the floor of the senate. What will then happen is only a matter of conjecture.

At the last session of the legislature a similar bill came near meeting an untimely death at the hands of the committee, and the friends of the measure will be fully awake to the dangers this time.

Jury List Being Drawn.
The county commissioners' court, which is in session today, is occupied with the jury list, which will be finished tonight, and will appear in tomorrow's paper. The court has made the statement that it is their desire that all persons whose names appear upon the list, who are exempt from jury duty, on account of membership of the fire department or militia, will please notify the county clerk at once, so that the list may be revised at an adjourned session. When court adjourns tonight they will adjourn until the next regular session, which will be held February 1, 1905.

without any trouble," Ryan, at another time said; "I wouldn't mind this so much, for I am innocent, if it had happened anywhere but here in Salem, but I had a good start and my share of friends here, and then to end it all by being placed under arrest, and dragged through the courts is hard. My case will be up before the supreme court about the 10th of next month, and I have not the slightest doubt but that I shall be acquitted, but at the same time it is very annoying, to say the least, to know that people will say, 'that man was under arrest for stealing once.'"

It will be remembered that the Ryan case originated from a foot race held in the road near the baseball park the week following the state fair. Roth, who is an Albina druggist, came to Salem to show the farmers a thing or two and backed a foot racer named Houston against a man named Morris, who was backed by W. C. Raymond, each backer putting up \$2000 in the hands of Ryan, who was to act as stakeholder. The race was run, and Roth's man fell down, losing the race, and Ryan said that he then paid the stakes over to Raymond, but Roth claimed that his man would have won the race had it not been for his accident, and had Ryan, who was in Kaseburg on business, put under arrest for stealing the stakes. Ryan says that the man Raymond, to whom he paid the money, testified to that fact in the justice court, but had to go East, and through some misunderstanding, his affidavit was not secured.
