## WRIGHT-MONTE TRIAL

Harry Wright and Charles Monte this afternoon were arraigned in Judge Burnett's court on the charge of murder in the first degree.

Wright was the first man brought before the court, and he walked into the room with a steady tread, and never flinched while District Attorney McNary read the indictment to him.

When he had finished reading the document that may mean eternity via the hemp route for the prisoner, Judge Burnett asked Wright if he desired an attorney, and he said that he did. When questioned as to choice he named J. A. Carson, but that gentleman said that he would be unable to take the case, as he would be in San Francisco for some time. The court then named P. H. D'Arcy.

The court set Monday, April 24th as the date when he will enter his plea.

Charles Monte was brought into the court room at 2 o'clock. He had been conveyed from the penitentiary to the court house in a closed cab, watched by Warden Curtis and a guard. A large number of people assembled to catch a glimpse of the prisoner, so that the court room was filled to its utmost capacity. When Monte entered the room his countenance seemed paler than usual and his eyes shifting uneasily over the faces turned to gaze at him, and finally sought the floor.

The prisoner having reached the platform in front of Judge Burnett's bench, he was asked his name. He replied that he preferred not to give his true name, but that he commonly went under the assumed name of Charles Monte. It was accordingly ruled that this name should be the one used. Monte then addressed the court saying that he failed to see how the court had any right to try him under the charge named in the indictment, until he had completed the sentence of six years, which he is now serving. Judge Burnett said he would not rule concerning the objection at present, but would arraign him now and postpone the decision until later. Having been asked if he had any choice of an attorney, and having expressed none, the court appointed H. J. Bigger to act for the defendant. Monte was also given until Monday to make answer to the charge.

Immediately after his arraignment Monte was securely handcuffed and taken back to the penitentiary.

### Fire Hose Test.

The 2500 feet of new hose recently ordered by the council arrived today, and this afternoon Chief Pugh, in the presence of a number of the members of the council, made a test to see if the hose came up to the specifications guaranteed by the manufacturers. A number of lengths of hose, 50 feet, were submitted to a hydraulic pressure of 500 pounds, and stood the test all right. Twelve hundred feet of hose was laid and a short turn made at a distance of 600 feet, and the engine put on. With a pressure of 270 pounds on from the engine a seven-eighths of an inch stream was thrown 150 feet. With this test no defect was found in the hose.

Chief Pugh will test separately each of the 50-foot lengths of hose of the 2500 feet by a hydraulic pressure of between 450 and 500 pounds.

### Committed Suicide.

Word was received here today that H. J. Cross, better known as "Shorty" Cross, had committed suicide about a month ago at Los Angeles by locking himself in a room, and inhaling gas. "Shorty" was well-known in Salem, having worked here for the Electric Light Co. a year ago, and for Eckstein last fall. At one time he had a good position in the quartermaster's department in the Philippines, and has had a number of paying situations in this country, but he was his own worst enemy, and kept losing his positions, until, probably, in a fit of despair or remorse, he ended it all by taking his life. He was well liked by all who knew him.
