PHONE IN A LAKE.

A Floating Telephone Placed in Great Salt Lake.

The first floating telephone in the world is to be installed in Great Salt Lake by the Rocky Mountain Bell Telephone company in time for the opening of the bathing season, says the Salt Lake Herald. Three thousand feet from the Saltair pavilion, where the average depth of water is more than four feet, the telephone will be placed on a buoy. The buoy will be anchored, and it will be possible to talk through the telephone to any city on the Rocky Mountain system.

The primary object of the installation is the saving of life. There have been times in the past when a telephone in the lake would have been the means of rescuing venturesome bathers. The management of the Saltair pavilion and the telephone company feel

that, if one rescue is made, the expense incident to the installation will be more than satisfied.

The buoy telephone's first connection will be with the private branch exchange that is being installed at Saltair. An operator will be constantly in charge of this station, so that it will be possible to call from the lake to any point in the city or about the pavilion, where the instruments connected with the branch exchange are to be distributed. The sensation of floating in the water and holding conversation with individuals many miles away will appeal to Saltair visitors this summer. It will be a distinct novelty.

WOMAN SUES FOR \$150,000

Claims Her Mother-in-law Alienated Her Husband's Affections

A very sensational suit has been commenced in the circuit court of Jackson county, in which the plaintiff, Mrs. Jane D. Champlin, of Chicago, sues Mrs. Abbie Champlin, her mother-in-law, for damages in the sum of \$150,000 for alleged alienating from her the affections of her husband, Frederick D. Champlin.

The complaint alleges that Mrs. Champlin and her husband were married in Chicago in 1896, and that their issue of the marriage is a son 8 years of age; that in November, 1902, the defendant, Mrs. Abbie Champlin, induced her son, Frederick Champlin, to forsake and abandon his wife by means of false and slanderous accusations and charges against her, and threatened to disinherit him if he did not yield to her wishes; that, because of such accusations, charges and threat, Champlin was induced to abandon his wife, leaving her destitute in New York city in December, 1902; that because of such desertion and alienation of affection, the plaintiff has suffered much bodily and mental anguish in consequence, whereof she seeks damages in the sum of \$150,000.

Frederick Champlin and son reside at Foots Creek, where Mr. Champlin is operating a large dredger, some fifteen miles from Grant's Pass. Mrs. Jane D. Champlin has resided in Grant's Pass for the past two years, where she has made ceaseless, yet unavailing, efforts to secure the custody of her son, her last rise being an alleged effort to kidnap him, which failed dismally. Mrs.

Champlin had invited the little boy, her son, and his nurse to meet her at Gold Hill for a little picnic there, and Mr. Champlin had allowed them to go. They had been picnicking some two hours or so, when two men appeared on the scene and, together with Mrs. Champlin, succeeded in spiriting the boy away in a carriage. The nurse, taking alarm and escaping, telephoned Mr. Champlin at the dredge, and he promptly sent out both officers and telegrams for the apprehension of the boy.

The carriage containing the two parties was located near Woodville, the boy recovered and again put into the custody of his father.

Mrs. Abbie Champlin, defendant in the suit, is a millionaire, and it is believed she will defend the suit most vigorously.
