### COMING TO MADRAS.

Great Southern Engineers Locating Line Into Crook County.

Surveyors of the Great Southern Railroad, which is now building an extension of their line from Dufur into Tygh valley, near the northern end of the Warm Springs Indian reservation, invaded the Madras district last week and have commenced the location of their line in that portion of the county. The Madras Pioneer says:

"A locating party belonging to the Great Southern Railway Company, commonly known as the Dufur road, is at present camped on the Bill Lyle ranch in the Big Cove on the Deschutes river, about seven miles below the mouth of Trout creek. F. S. Gordon, chief engineer in charge, spent last Friday and Saturday in Madras, looking around for the most feasible route for reaching Madras. On Saturday he made a horseback reconnaissance down Willow creek from Madras to the mouth, and stated upon his return that a very good line could be constructed that way.

"The surveying party is now making a very careful location of the route from Dufur for about 100 miles out this way, preparatory to letting of contracts for construction work early in the spring. Mr. Gordon says that his people are very anxious to begin this 100 miles extension and that as soon as favorable weather sets in next spring, work will be started and they hope to have the 100 miles completed and trains running within a year from that time."

### Fisk University Anniversary.

Nashville, Tenn., Jan. 6.—Fisk University is celebrating its fortieth anniversary today, and the whole city is, to the same extent, taking part in the celebration, which will extend over three days. Several alumni of the university have arrived here to take part in the celebration of their alma mater, and among them are many prominent men, holding important positions in various states all over the country. There are also many distinguished educators from all parts of the country here, many of whom will speak at the various meetings and banquets given in honor of the celebration.

The anniversary celebration proper will begin this evening with a large meeting, at which Dr. H. H. Proctor of Atlanta, Ga., a Fisk alumnus, will give a review of the work which Fisk University has done for the colored race during the 40 years of its existence. Booker T. Washington will also deliver an address. Tomorrow morning the Rev. A. S. Beard of New York will deliver a lecture. Addresses will also be delivered by Chancellor J. H. Kirkland of Vanderbilt University, Dr. George W. Hubbard, Dean of Maharry Medical College, and Professor H. A. Vance of Peabody College.

Nearly the entire amount needed for the Fisk Scientific School has been raised. When the entire amount has been raised, the Slater fund will subscribe an annual endowment of \$5000 for the maintenance of the school. The proposed school will be located in a brick building to be erected near the main structure of the university. Andrew Carnegie has offered \$20,000 for a library, provided an equal amount should be raised by subscription. It is quite probable that in a very short time an effort will be made to raise the necessary sum.

Pittsburg, Pa., Jan. 6.—Dr. Douglas Hyde, the head of the Gaelic League, who is now on a lecture tour through the United States, to arouse interest in the study of the ancient Irish tongue, arrived here this morning for a day's visit. This evening he will deliver a lecture before a large Irish meeting to be held in the old city hall. Dr. Hyde is not only an ardent champion of the Gaelic language, but, in Ireland, is regarded as the coming man and a leader of the Parnell class. The proceeds from his lecture will be used to advance the interests of Home Rule in Ireland.

The United Irish Societies of this city had made elaborate preparations for the reception and entertainment of the distinguished visitor. Upon his arrival he was received by a committee headed by Mr. J. F. O'Loughlin, whose guest Dr. Hyde will be during the day. In honor of Dr. Hyde, a reception will be given in the afternoon and a banquet in the evening.
