Indiana State Dairy Association.

Anderson, Ind., Jan. 24.—The sixteenth annual meeting of the Indiana State dairy association opened here today with a large attendance, representing every part of the state. Many prominent representatives of this important industry are here and some will deliver addresses before the convention.

At this convention particular attention will be given to the problems of the milk producer. One of the interesting features of the meeting will be a cow judging demonstration by experts. The development of the field work and the educational butter securings conducted by the Purdue Experiment station have been of great value to the dairymen of this state and have greatly increased the interest of the farmers and dairymen in a more scientific method in dairy work.
