ENDORSE SENATOR FULTON

And Uphold Roosevelt's Railroad Rate Policies

Demand Fair Trial of the Direct Primary Law and Pledge to Support Candidates

The Roosevelt Republican Club last night gave a hearty endorsement to Hon. C. W. Fulton for his stand on the rate law, in support of the Roosevelt administration. Resolutions were adopted supporting the President in his great battle for the control and regulation of rates, and endorsing the direct primary law and pledging the support of the club to all the candidates nominated thereunder.

Following officers were elected: J. N. Smith, president; Frank Davy, secretary; H. A. Johnson, L. A. Manning, F. B. Southwick, vice-presidents; F. N. Derby, treasurer. The President is authorized to appoint one from each ward as a campaign committee.

A Simple Organization.

Chairman Johnson, of the committee on organization, reported the following articles of organization and order of business:

Any American citizen who is a supporter of the principles of the Republican party shall be eligible to membership in this club.

The object of the organization shall be to secure the success of the Republican party in Oregon at each election where the Republican ticket is placed before the people for their suffrages.

The officers of this club shall be a president, three vice-presidents, a secretary and a treasurer, and a campaign committee of one from each ward, to be appointed by the chair.

"Order of business—Election of president, three vice-presidents, secretary, treasurer."

Endorse Roosevelt and Fulton.
The committee on resolutions made the following report, which was unanimously adopted, and the president and secretary were instructed to send engraved copies of the national portion thereof to President Roosevelt and Senator Fulton.

Support the Public Schools.

The Roosevelt Republican Club, of Salem, a loyal organization of Republicans, at the Capital City of Oregon, declare that we heartily support the administration of President Roosevelt in his fearless demand for better government, in his struggle for railway rate regulation and abolition of rebates, and we unhesitatingly declare his statesmanship and diplomacy in dealing with foreign affairs as among the greatest achievements in the history of our country.

We endorse the able presentation by Senator Charles W. Fulton, of Oregon, of his amendments to the interstate commerce act, giving the courts and the commission fuller power to correct unjust rates and traffic arrangements on interstate railways.

We regard him as a man worthy of the highest confidence of the people, and in point of ability the equal of any of his senatorial competitors, and a just cause of pride to the Republicans of Oregon.

John Jensen, an employee of the Wending logging camp near Eugene, has disappeared, and no trace can be found of him. He has not been heard of since January 25. Friends think he became mentally deranged and has committed suicide.

Homer Cole, a student of the University of Oregon, is the first victim of the typhoid fever at that place. He died Wednesday at the home of his parents in Eugene. He was a member of the senior class, and was considered one of the brightest students at the university.

Another gold find has been discovered near Ashland. It consists of a strong vein several feet in width between well defined walls. Several tests have been made which assay about \$20 per ton. A very promising gold quartz mine is being developed in an orchard in the city limits of Ashland.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC WORKING

Spends \$100,000 in Eastern Papers to Advertise Coast Mans Special Trains
