now awaiting further information. The position is one of the highest in the Philippine service, and commands a good salary. ## INSURANCE TRUST IN OREGON

### Taking a Hand in Electing a Congressman

### Tobacco and Sugar Trust Dipping Into the Sensational Contest

Are the trusts taking a hand in electing congressmen and senators in Oregon?

It is known that the kingpins of the timber land ring and the school land ring favor one candidate for congress. It is not Toozee.

It is reported that one candidate for congress has had a \$50,000 life insurance policy GIVEN HIM by the agents at Roseburg, with the understanding that the agents were to help ELECT him, and if he was elected he was to STAND BY the company in legislation touching insurance.

The big insurance robberies in New York and the exposing of their enormous campaign contributions would justify the inference that the insurance combine is in politics. The rumor that the insurance was issued is widespread. It was not issued to Toozee.

All the accusations against the Woodburn candidate for congress come from newspapers supporting OR HIRED TO SUPPORT, other candidates, but none of them have accused Mr. Toozee of spending any money but his own.

The hop-buyer of French Prairie, the potato-king of Marion count, the largest produce dealer of Western Oregon, has not got any campaign funds from the land-grabbers, from the insurance trust, or any other iniquitous source.

### Trusts Want Senator.

All the trust organs in Oregon are opposed to electing a United States senator by direct vote of the people. On top of that the trusts are said to have a candidate.

One Portland candidate for senator is accused of having turned to the trusts. A circular just out says: "The firm of Mason, Ehrman & Co., the principal distributors in Oregon for the sugar trust and for the tobacco trust, has come out openly, and have written to each of their customers throughout the state to give their support and votes to Mr. Cake. These customers probably are not aware of the fact that the sugar trust and the tobacco trust are willing to spend enormous sums of money to prevent free trade with the Philippines. These trusts have already been strong enough in the United States congress to thwart the efforts of President Roosevelt in behalf of the people."

"The people want no more senators acting as the direct agents of the trusts, that oppose our President, and have had such laws enacted that the income of the average American family has sunk to a mere pittance, that of 27,000,000 children of school age, less than half go to school and more than 2,000,000 work in mines, shops and factories, giving their tender years of childhood to toil and dying before maturity, that the trusts may live."

### Lowell Against Trusts.

Hon. S. A. Lowell, who opens the senatorial campaign at Salem Friday evening, is well known to be opposed to the trusts in all forms. So is Walter L. Toozee. Let the people catch onto the main facts of this campaign.
