

PLAIN TRUTH MAY BE WORSE THAN A LIE

Here is a proposition which came to me some time ago, a discussion of which ought to carry at least a few suggestions to the young man who is starting out in business life.

When the question of salary was asked, the young man should have told the truth, but as an incidental, inconsequential something—now! In consideration of the possibilities of the work and the chance of learning it, he had been working at an almost nominal salary.

Prince Arthur's Visit.

Vancouver, B. C., March 28.—Extensive preparations have been made for the reception of His Royal Highness Prince Arthur of Connaught, who is expected to arrive here today on the steamship Empress from Yokohama.

The prince is returning from Japan, where he went as the representative of King Edward VII. to confer the Order of the Garter upon the Emperor of Japan.

In compliance with the wishes of the prince there will be no public demonstrations on a large scale. His royal highness is to be the guest of the Dominion government during his tour through Canada and will also make a number of stops, but will travel as privately as possible under the circumstances.

The number of addresses at the reception will be limited to an address by the mayor, to which the prince will reply.

Prince Arthur will spend a few days shooting and fishing in this vicinity, and will then leave for Ottawa over the Canadian Pacific railroad. He will make only a few short stops at some of the tourists' resorts in the Rockies.
