DEATH IN HER EMBRACE

After a day spent in investigating the death of Thomas Dougherty, of Dunmore, Pa., who was killed by being pierced in the heart by a long needle, the local police and County Detective Phillips decided to draw the warrant that had been issued for the arrest of Katie Burke, the girl who was suspected of having caused Dougherty's death.

The authorities are of the opinion that the girl is innocent of murderous intent. She says that she had been mending her brother's clothing with a long needle, used hereabouts in mending miners' heavy outer clothing, and that on going down town in the evening she stuck the needle in the bosom of her dress. Dougherty, who had been her sweetheart, hailed her and asked her to talk a walk with him. He attempted to embrace her and the point of the needle that was in her dress caught in his vest, while the "eye" or blunt end rested against her corset. In the embrace the needle was forced into his body, through the fifth rib and into the cavity between the pericardium and the heart. Hemorrhages resulted that caused death.

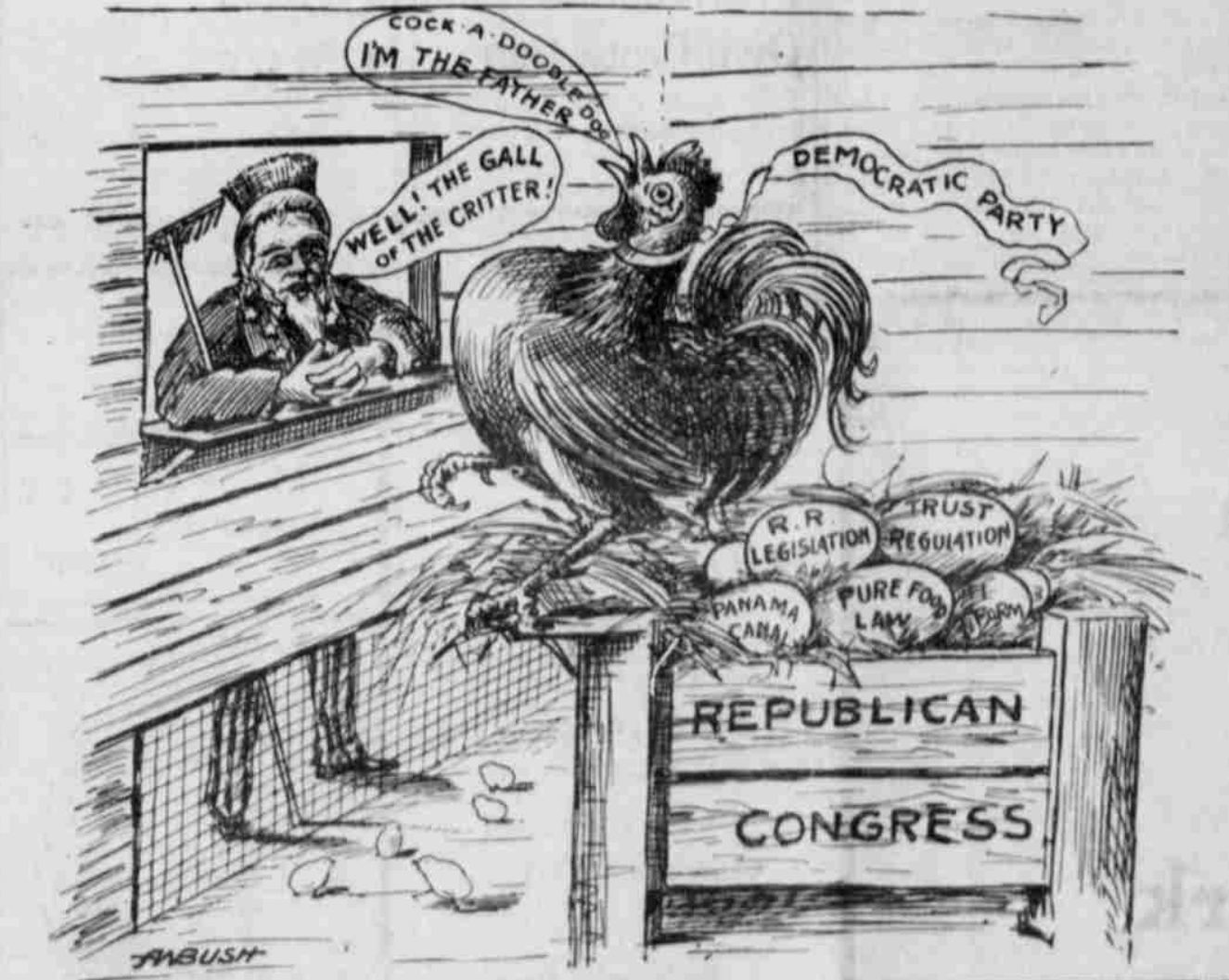

carried on extensively not only in India but in China. Indian opium is commonly held to be the more delicate of the two; its effects are not so immediately apparent. To this, as well as to the lower price, is due the immense use of Chinese rather than Indian opium by the Chinese. The consternation of Indian growers, with their decreasing Chinese market, can, therefore, be imagined at reading an edict of the Chinese government, published the other day, which orders the formation of a commission of inquiry into the best means of prohibiting the use of opium within the next ten years. Coincidentally with this it was announced that Yuan Shi Kai, viceroy of the province of Chi-li and the most influential statesman in China today,

in stopping the opium importation from India, would not be so great as might be supposed. Possibly Mr. Morley had this in mind when he said the other day in the house of commons that if China seriously wanted to restrict her consumption of opium the British government would not close the door to an agreement. However willing the Chinese government might be to influence those Englishmen who would bring public opinion to bear upon their government toward abolishing India's treaty privileges with China concerning opium, is quite another question whether the Chinese government would care to diminish its own income from opium-growing. Even some Chinese who denounce the opium trade have been growers

illicit or moral, would be not a cessation of the use of opium in China, but an increase of the tax upon the opium fields so as gradually to reduce the demand. Thus the government would attain a diplomatic, financial solution of the difficulty.—The Outlook.
