Big Round-up of Cayses.

Sixteen hundred untamed cayses are now wildly plunging in the round up corrals on the Switzer ranch just below Umatilla on the Washington side of the river. The annual round-up is now on in full swing and hundreds of the unbroken range horses are being gathered together for the purposes of segregation and sale to the highest bidder.

A large number of buyers are on hand to bid for the animals as soon as the bands of the different owners are separated from each other. They will be bid for in carload lots and most of them shipped east. In the band now gathered there are probably not over a hundred head which will weigh 1100 or 1200 pounds. The majority of the animals being the common cayses pony of 800 or 900 pounds weight. Twelve cowboys are engaged in the work and they present an interesting sight as they skillfully perform their work. The horses are exceeding wild but are handled with ease by the boys who know how.

The affair is an annual event and were it not for the fact that the place of holding the round-up is in the barren sands of the Columbia desert there would doubtless be a large crowd of interested spectators on hand to view the work of the riders.—Pendleton Tribune.

The French Working-girl.

In Paris, or the immediate en-

viron, there are of course "mill hands" among the working women, says Mrs. John von Vorst in the July Lippincott's. But whereas with us the scarcity of labor and consequent high wages make the factory girl rather an aristocrat in the laborer's social scale, working often merely to augment the luxuries of her existence, in Paris the factories are filled with the drags, the unskilled ouvrieries, generally widows or women in misfortune who bear unaided the burden of a family, and work in dire necessity for bread to feed hungry mouths.

There is, on the other hand, a class of young women in Paris that work as our factory girl does: "not because she has to, but because she wants the extra money." She lives in her family, and is contented with wages smaller than any that a man would take, which for this reason are readily offered her by houses where reliability and some instruction are required, as, for example, in the Credit Lyonnais, which employs nine hundred women in the Paris bank alone. This important company, so sure does it wish to be of the character and morality of its employees, makes it a condition of acceptance for these women that they shall live in their own families or in the family of some friend who will act as guardian. But these employes—however interesting the conditions under which they work—do not come under the head of midnettes, and are in no way descendants from the grisette of old.

City Buried Beneath Waves.

One of the most wonderful archaeological discoveries of modern times has just been reported from the coast of Tunis, says a recent dispatch from Paris.

While some sponge divers were cruising on the northern coast of Stax, one of their number who had gone to the bottom suddenly found himself among the columns and fallen monuments of some great ruined city on the bed of the ocean. At first he thought he was the victim of some remarkable mirage, but as he proceeded further incredulity gave place to certainty. He dived again and found that he was surrounded by the ruins of a great temple with marble and bronze statues in profusion.

He reported that large numbers of the pillars are still standing and one or two of the statues were raised and brought aboard the boat, and taken to Stax. The discoverers communicated the discovery to the French and Tunisian authorities, and a concerted effort is to be made to get up as much as possible of the sunken city.
