NEW HEADS FOR STATE INSTITUTIONS.

The state board, consisting of the governor, treasurer and secretary of state have the selection of persons for the heads of four state institutions in the next few months.

They are to be chosen superintendents of the state insane asylum, for the home for feeble-minded and epilectic and state reform school, and for the state blind institute.

For the insane asylum the law requires a physician, but the institution is so large THAT ADMINISTRATIVE AND EXECUTIVE ABILITY ARE AS IMPORTANT IF NOT MORE SO THAN PROFESSIONAL

For the other three institutions there should not be ordinary political appointments made. In fact justice to the state requires that those

places be not filled as rewards for political services. That a man who has merely been a Republican politician should be put in charge of the blind school, the reform school, of the feebleminded, is not a good proposition, and PROBABLY WILL NOT BE EN-

TERTAINED BY THE STATE BOARD. Each of these appointments should be made from the standpoint of the needs of the public service and the unfortunate class that the state

seeks to make provision for. Recently the state board in control of the agricultural college turned down all the political applicants and selected from among several men who had some reputation for work in agricultural college and government experiment stations.

As a result of this process, the board finds that in President Kerr it has A MAN WHO UNDERSTANDS WHAT IS REQUIRED IN THE CON-DUCT OF AN AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE. So in the deafmute school a specialist was chosen from Michigan.

It is putting Oregon in the class with freak states to take up men who know nothing about education of the blind, or the feeble-minded or of reform achool work, and turning them loose on those unfortunates.

The education of the blind, the care of the feeble-minded and the reformation of wayward boys has become the work of well-defined specialists, AND NEVER WAS POLITICAL WORK IN ANY SENSE OF THE TERM.

Machine political appointments are bad enough in the general public service of the state, but constitute almost a crime against the state and the unfortunates whom it assumes to benefit.

Oregon has outgrown that kind of politics, and the state board would be warranted in turning down the merely political applicant for the head of any state institution. THE PEOPLE HAVE OUTGROWN THE PO-LITICAL GRAFT.

It is unjust to the taxpeyers and the cause of good government to appoint men in charge of any educational or reform work who have to learn all they know at the expense of the public and the defectives.

Such appointments are defective in themselves and the people who elect our state officials have a right to be protected against such administration of public trusts.

THE CITY AND FRANCHISES.

The position of Mayor Rodgers in demanding that the Home Telephone company comply with the terms of its franchise and install and operate its plant in this city, or forfelt its bond is correct.

With their eyes open, with trained lawyers and franchise experts to draft their franchises, THESE CORPORATIONS GET CERTAIN VALU-ABLE RIGHTS AND ENTER INTO A CONTRACT TO DO CERTAIN THINGS.

The city does its part, and then up comes Mr. Corporation and proposes to violate the terms of the agreement which he proposed in order

A corporation comes in and gets a franchise, uses it to browbeat a corporation already in business, and gives a bond to secure the aid of the city government in its hold-up enterprise, and WHY SHOULD IT NOT PAY FOR THE PRIVILEGE, AND ESPECIALLY IF IT DE-

It is well known that in these days of mergers, telephone and street railway franchises are generally first used to compel some other common carrier to buy them out.

If that does not succeed they sell the franchiseto some other company and evade liability for the execution of its terms in that way. This game should not be permitted to be played.

The city should insist on such a franchise policy as will bring results.

The Anson franchise BROUGHT MONEY INTO THE CITY TREASURY. The Oregon Electric franchise BROUGHT ANOTHER STREET CAR LINE INTO THE CITY. The city should follow the example set by the Hayseed city council and

collect the \$25,000 band of the Home Telephone company for failure to keep its part of the contract. Is the city to be made the mere sport and plaything of the franchise

grabber, who generally STARTS IN WITH MANIPULATING THE CITY GOVERNMENT AND WINDS UP WITH VIOLATION OF ITS LAWS?

In the case of the franchise referred to, a corporation gave a \$5000

bond to install a steam heating and electric plant within a certain time. The franchise was procured for mere trafficking purposes, and the bond was collected and put in the city treasury.

The Capital Journal can refer to a more recent case, where the Oregon Electric was about to secure a franchise on High street, BUT WAS MADE TO PUT UP A \$15,000 CASH BOND TO BUILD AND OPERATE ITS LINE.

The Capital Journal made the fight to force construction from Salem to Chemawa and operation of cars by September 10, 1906, and the cars are running ever since for no other reason.

This city needs new electric lines in several directions, but is not go- As Typified and Presented By Ezra ing to get them by granting unconditional blanket franchises to all who

ask for them. A true franchise policy for this city should require not only a heavy collectable bond, but at least two per cent taxes on the gross earnings, proper care of streets, and CONSTRUCTION WITHIN AT LEAST SIX MONTHS OF ENOUGH LINES TO PAY OPERATING EXPENSES.

These are not unreasonable provisions. These corporations are properly chargeable with street improvements. The gross earnings tax is very small, \$20 on the \$1000 collected as fares,

The demand that they shall give a bond for a rasonable time limit as to when they shall be constructed is also right and IN THE TRUE INTEREST OF THE CITY.

To tie up this city and its streets for many years with franchises that are merely to be used as trading stock is not a wise policy for any city to pursue.

THE ELECTION OF SENATORS.

Western Oregon of Cottage Grove brings out some good points in favor of the direct nomination and election of U. S. senators.

It shows that under the Oregon plan the legislature does elect, but THE PEOPLE ARE GIVEN GREATER VOICE IN THE MATTER AND REALLY CONTROL.

It shows that U. S. senators are nominated and elected just as other state officials are and in the same manner and why should they not be? The people do not elect the President, but they choose electors who elect the President. BUT JUST THE SAME THE PROPLE DECIDE

WHO IS ELECTED. The members of the legislature are not legally bound to vote for the people's choice for U. S. senator but they are morally obligated to.

No Presidential elector has ever been known to support any other than the choice of the people for President, and THE SAME WILL BE TRUE OF THE OREGON PLAN FOR CHOOSING U. S. SENATORS.

Editor Gault also shows that it is not the people who have cause for finding fault with the direct primary, but the professional politcian who is not certain of the support of the voters if he gets a nomination by foul or unfair means.
