The Atlantic Monthly announces
that this fall it will celebrate its
semi-centennial. This "backbone of
American magazines," so independ-
ent in the plainness of its orange
cover and its refusal to print
pictures, deserves hearty congratula-
tions from all over the country.
Half a century is a long time in this
land for anything, and half a cen-
tury of sound writing and thinking
on vital topics by our soundest pub-
lic men calls for more than passing
notice. Turning to the files we find
in the first issue (November, 1857),
Parke Godwin's "The Financial
Flurry," the title alone of which
suggests its spirit. In the last issue
(August, 1907), Anna A. Rogers
writes on a subject of large inter-
est: "Why American Marriages
Fail." And in the long series of
brilliant articles between we read
many important chapters in Ameri-
can history. A career like the
Atlantic's is unique in the magazine
world.
