HOW CHINKS WORKED IN

San Francisco, Jan. 17.—A gigantic scheme to defeat the ends of the Chinese exclusion act and permit the wholesale entry of Asiatic coolies into this country has just been uncovered by the local United States immigration authorities.

The discovery exposes the methods by which Chinese laborers have been fraudulently gaining admission to this country for the past few years under pretense that they were "native sons."

The principal feature of the fraud is a large "coaching map," showing the Chinese section of this city, and also the principal landmarks. It was only necessary for the applicant for admission to the United States to study this map in order to gather a sufficient knowledge of the city to sustain his pose as a "native son." Over the head of the map is printed in large letters "Plan of Chinatown, San Francisco, Cal." Then follow the principal instructions in regard to answering the questions which would most likely be asked by the inspector.

SEARCHING FOR SHIP HARTFIELD

(United Press Leased Wire.) Seattle, Wash., Jan. 17.—Captain F. M. Manger, of Uori Townsend, has ordered the revenue cutters Perry and Thetis to search for possible survivors or any news of the British ship Hartfield, which is believed to have been wrecked on the east coast of Vancouver Island. The Canadian government announced that no boat could be dispatched from British Columbia until more definite information is received. Both the cutters left Seattle harbor last night. The cutters have a distance of about 350 miles to travel to the scene of the possible wreck. They will make a careful search of the Vancouver Island coast, both for survivors and for any traces which may definitely establish the fate of the vessel.

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 17.—The British ship Hartfield, from Liverpool to Seattle, is believed to have been wrecked, with 20 souls aboard, off the west coast of Vancouver Island. A wireless message reports that the vessel's deckhouse and several empty boats were washed ashore yesterday morning. The ship's captain is A. S. Anderson, and his wife and family probably were aboard.

BODY EATEN BY COYOTES

A dispatch from Madras, Or., January 14, says:

Remnants of the body of Dr. Lee, an aged Indian physician, living on the Warm Springs reservation, were found on a trail leading from the agency to the Indian town of Simnashe, Saturday. Only the larger bones of the body and the lower limbs from the knees down were found, the remainder of the body having apparently been devoured by coyotes. The body was positively identified by remnants of the clothing still clinging to the bones, and by the saddle of the Indian, which was found lying near the body.

Dr. Lee lived about three miles from the Warm Springs agency. He left home last Thanksgiving, saying nothing to his wife about his destination, and, as he frequently went away for weeks at a time, nothing was thought of his absence. His death is believed to have been the result of foul play, as, in common with other Indian "doctors" on the reservation, he had enemies among the Indians. To strengthen the belief in foul play, it is known that when he left home he carried with him a large 44-calibre pistol. This could not be found anywhere about the body. It is further pointed out that his saddle

lay on the ground uncinched, as though it had been removed from the cayuse he was riding by some person, in order to avoid the suspicion which would have been aroused by seeing a horse running on the range with a saddle on.

Dr. Lee was a Warm Spring Indian and about 60 years of age.
