### CREMATED IN THE JAIL

Santa Fe, N. M., Jan. 17.—As a result of a fire started for the purpose of burning a hole large enough for them to crawl through, R. B. Nesbitt, Jr., and Cecil Whitlock, two prisoners in the county jail at Estancia, Torrence county, are dead. The victims, who were sons of highly respected families at Estancia, were arrested while engaged in shooting up the town by Deputy Sheriff Nesbitt, brother of one of the victims. Finding themselves in jail they sought to escape in order to avoid disgrace, but the fire got beyond their control and they were suffocated and the bodies cremated before assistance arrived.

**Big Orchard Sold.**  
(United Press Leased Wire.) Marysville, Cal., Jan. 17.—The famous Abbott orchard in Sutter county, one of the largest in California, was sold today to a colony of Russian peasants for a sum said to be in the neighborhood of \$100,000. The orchard covers 700 acres, and is partly full of bearing trees. There are 14 families in the colony, which is the first to be established in the state. They will build homes, a church, a schoolhouse and devote their time to raising vegetables.
