

LOCAL OPTION THE ISSUE

A new liquor ordinance, which was framed by Mayor Rodgers, and a committee consisting of Councilmen Moores, Frasure and Eldridge, and which is one of the most modern liquor license ordinances in existence, failed to come up before the council meeting last night owing to the adjournment taken by that body to attend the banquet tendered in honor of the union between the Boosters' club and the board of trade.

The new license provides that private boxes must be eliminated from the saloons; that no women patrons or minors be allowed in the saloons; that the portion of saloons facing on the street be glass for a width of 10 feet from a height of five feet above the ground to eight feet above, glass to be clear and nothing to obstruct the view from the street; no habitual drunkards or those intoxicated at the time to be served; no saloon to be within 400 feet of any school; requiring the licensing of private bars in clubs (having more than 1600 square feet in floor space), and also the requiring of a license from a restaurant.

The amounts of the licenses for saloons, drug stores, restaurants was to have been fixed by the council. It is probable it will be taken up and passed at the next meeting.

The following matters were taken up and acted upon by the council: Resolution to improve State street from Church to Commercial grading the entire street according to the specification on file with the city recorder. The space between the rails of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company and the Oregon Electric company and one and one-half outside of the rails will be assessed to the respective companies.

Resolution to construct a cement sidewalk, 5 feet wide, on the south side of Court street from Waverly to Sixteenth.

Resolution to improve Court street from Church to Eighteenth by grading and changing curbs to make street uniform width of 30 feet.

Resolution repealing ordinances 510 and 538 relating to improving of State and other streets, which have become dead-letters owing to late ordinances.

Resolution for construction of a five-foot wooden sidewalk on west side of Capitol street from Union to D, and south side of D street from Capitol to Seventeenth.

Resolution to construct five-foot wooden sidewalk along east side of Commercial street from D to North Mill creek.

Petition for continuing alley now running from Fourteenth to Fifteenth street, through to Seventeenth.

Resolution to improve Broadway by grading from North Mill creek to Madison street and by removing Portland Railway, Light & Power company to street center.

Resolution to improve Winter street from North Mill creek to Fair grounds road. The improvement will be 12 feet wide and will also include the removing of the bridge at the junction of Winter street with the fairground road and the filling in of the ditch, which is dry, to the road level.

Resolution improving Hood street by grading and removal of Portland Railway, Light & Power company tracks to street center.

The council then adjourned until Thursday evening in order to attend the Boosters' banquet in a body.

Reform School Report.

The report of D. H. Looney, superintendent of the Reform school, shows that during the past quarter there has been expended on general expenses, \$7,024.93, and from the improvement fund, \$114.30. The report, which was read and approved at the meeting of the board, consisting of Governor Chamberlain, Secretary of State Benson and State Treasurer Steele, shows that at the present time there are 116 pupils in the institution; there being, on the first of January, 1908, since when 25 have been admitted, 15 discharged, 1 escaped and 1 on leave of absence. Rupert D. Howell has been put on parole, in charge of his mother, Mrs. C. A. Howell, of Tacoma. Clarence Harvey has also been paroled to the care of his mother.
