Do you remember the circus of childhood days, which consisted of a few performances of mediocre ability, possibly a lion, an elephant, a few horses and several old red wagons? In comparison, the present day circus is a thing to marvel at. To transport the Greater Norris & Rowe circus, museum, menageries, hippodrome and congress of nations it requires 40 double length cars, or three special trains.

There are over 200 performers, and about 550 people in all departments.

Sleeping accommodations and three meals a day for this vast army of souls must be provided, and as they are a rugged class, the food, must

The acres of tents and other paraphernalia of the circus must be erected on short notice; the parade given, two performances, one in the afternoon and the other at night and a jump to the next stand of possibly 150 or 200 miles made.

A veterinary surgeon and two assistants to look after all of the stock is with the show.

An ordained minister is with the circus as a spiritual advisor, and to hold services in the tents of the big show every Sunday morning and evening. And the strange part of it is, that scarcely a performer or workman around the show, fails to avail themselves of the benefits to be derived therefrom.

A graduate of Stanford university, with a M. A. degree after his name, gives free of charge, instruction to all of the children and employees of the show that care to avail themselves of this splendid opportunity for advancement.

A well equipped blacksmith shop with three husky blacksmiths are carried with the circus.

A harness shop in which is repaired most of the harness used on the 300 horses is another department.

A barber shop with three first-class barbers, for the accommodation of the employees is another department.

In the ticket wagon, is a well equipped office, with typewriters, secretaries and clerks. It is from this place that the vast machinery of the show is kept oiled, from the master, mighty brain of the general manager, H. S. Rowe. Every little detail of the vast circus is looked after here, and if there is a quieter or busier office in the country, than that presided over by Manager Rowe we do not know it.

Court is Now to be Paved.
A meeting of Court street property owners at the Board of Trade rooms Saturday night, at which H. S. Gile presided, may result in a resolution for the paving of that street passing the council at the meeting tonight. Heretofore several attempts have been made to pave this thoroughfare, but one stumbling block after another has been encountered so that each time it came before the council it was voted "laid on the table indefinitely." The main bone of contention is as to the width of the street, some desiring a 30-foot street from Church to Fifteenth, while others claim that by so narrowing it, it would be spoiled. The nearest approach at harmony by the property owners was reached last night, when Frank Meredith, H. B. Thielsen and George Rose were appointed a committee to investigate and aid the passage of a paving ordinance. About one-half of those assembled favored a width of 34 feet. Councilman Stoiz, chairman of the street committee, was present at the meeting.
