COLEMAN ELECTED PRESIDENT

FORMER PRESIDENT OF WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY CALLED TO CALIFORNIA INSTITUTION—UNIVERSITY OF PACIFIC.

Word was received from the east Saturday night that Rev. John H. Coleman, D.D., late president of Willamette University, had been elected president of the University of the Pacific at San Jose, California. The institution is under the patronage of the California conference of the Methodist church. It is situated 45 miles from San Francisco, and has six buildings and a campus of 15 acres. The plant is valued at \$200,000.

FLOOD IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

SUMAS PRAIRIE INUNDATED—FRAZER AND CHILLIWACK RIVERS OVERFLOW—LOSS IN THE THOUSANDS.

Bellingham, Wash., June 15.—Fifteen thousand acres of farm and pasture lands are overflowed, crops worth thousands of dollars are ruined and several scores of ranchers have been driven to seek shelter on the high lands by the flooding of Sumas prairie, just across the line in British Columbia. The flood is rising and the slightly higher lands on the American side are now in danger of submergence. The water is higher than it has been since 1894.

San Francisco, June 15.—The police of this city have communicated with the authorities of other cities all over the country in their efforts to discover the careers of Geo. E. MARVELOUS INVENTION OF HIRAM MAXIM

(United Press Lensed Wire.) Washington, June 15.—While the ordnance bureau of the army says that no overtures for the test of his noiseless gun have been made by Hiram Maxim, all of the officers believe that a government test will be held soon. One of the experts said today: "It can be said to revolutionary. The adoption of a noiseless gun would necessitate the solution of a number of entirely new military problems. It would add tremendously to the horrors of war. If the test made was as successful as it has been declared to be, then Maxim has made a wonderful discovery and one that will necessitate much study on the part of military experts."

A member of the national committee this afternoon stated that the anti-injunction proposition will be eliminated from the platform. He claimed that the best interests of the country were opposed to it. The Taft managers' practically have acquiesced in eliminating it, he said, and added: "The President wouldn't insist and, if he didn't nobody else would, except Gompers and his following."

New York Wants Hughes.

The 40 New York state delegates held a caucus at which it was unanimously decided to cast the state's vote for Hughes on the first ballot. The Massachusetts delegation adopted resolutions declaring for Governor Guild for the vice presidency. Senator Knox's son, in company with 15 millionaires, left Pittsburg for Chicago to "do politics."

No Fairbanks for Roosevelt.

Washington, June 15.—It is learned on good authority that President Roosevelt and Secretary Taft prefer either Senator Dolliver or Governor Cummings, of Iowa, to Vice President Fairbanks for the second place on the ticket.
