Bellingham, Wash., June 15 .-Fifteen thousand acres of farm and pasture lands are overflowed, crops worth thousands of dollars are ruined and several scores of ranchers have been driven to seek shelter on Sumas prairie, just across the line in British Columbia. The flood is rising and the slightly higher lands on the American side are now in danger of submersion. The water is higher than it has been since 1894.
