

# COUNCIL REPLIES TO OREGON ELECTRIC MANAGER'S DEFY

### ONE SALOON LICENSE VACATED—SEVERAL ORDERED TO COMPLY WITH NEW ORDINANCE.

Manager Talbot, of the Oregon Electric, sent into the city council an able review and rather peppery statement about improvement of North High and Broadway, and city council orders mayor to notify corporation to come through with the improvement.

War was declared on saloons not complying with the new city ordinances. Recorder Moores shows city finances have been kept in good condition.

Eldridge, Fraser Greenbaum, Millard, Moffit, Moores, Presnall, Radcliff, Stolz and the mayor were present.

### More Street Paving.

The bids of the Warren Construction company for paving three blocks of State street, from Commercial to Church were accepted.

On report of city engineer Fraser moved to allow 80 per cent of the amount stated to have been completed work of Warren Construction company, \$1693.45, less cost of filling holes for telephone poles.

The street commissioner reported expenditures of \$1281.92 for the month of June; also a large number of sidewalks and crosswalks put in and ordered built.

Special committee composed of committee on ordinances, mayor and city attorney on compilation of ordinances reported work all completed except indexing.

### Site for Street Department.

Stolz reported verbally on a site for street department. The committee favored selling its old fire department building on State street, and that the city recorder advertise the property for sale, and then purchase a cheaper lot. He offered a motion to that effect and it was carried. He would buy a new site at a much cheaper price and pay for it out of the lighting fund.

He favored buying the Hiram Smith lot, 1/2 size 160x80, west of the soap factory, just north of the woolen mills, one block from State street, for \$500.

Greenbaum moved that the matter be referred to the committee on public buildings. Moores moved to amend that committee receive bids for a site. It was ordered referred after objection by Fraser, that Thirteenth street was not opened and that property had no frontage. Moffit asked if property was not subject to inundation from the Mill creek ditch.

### A Dog Day Bill.

Bill of J. C. Marsh was rejected and re-referred. It was for killing dogs during the month of June; for feeding five dogs four days, \$4; killing and burying \$5, total \$9.

ing that the matter be properly considered. Stolz reviewed the matter from the standpoint of the street committee. He asked what had the former city government granted to the Oregon Electric on that street.

Was the Tillman grade correct? Mayor Waters said there was no agreement of record as to where the grade was. The franchise was granted and the Tillman grade was approved by the city. Expert Engineer Thielson said the Tillman grade was correct. The report of the street committee was fair to all interested parties. The matter was ended so far as this council was concerned. It may have been a poor way of doing business, but the Oregon Electric was just as careless as the city. Mr. Talbot's letter was placed on file and the matter closed.

### To Improve North High.

Mayor Rodgers was instructed to write Manager Talbot to the effect that the city was ready to improve North High and Broadway, and that the corporation proceed to come to grade.

### Transfer Saloon License.

Petition of Alex Conoyer to transfer saloon license to D. A. Madison. Eldridge moved to not allow. Lost. On motion referred to committee on licenses.

### Violating Saloon Law.

Presnall called attention to several saloons not complying with new saloon ordinance. He moved that same be referred to committee on health and police. Carried.

Presnall reported from committee on saloon licenses that James and Swartz be granted a license.

### Bad Saloon Closed.

Same committee reported that license to Joseph Tyler be not granted. Fraser moved that same be referred to committee on health and police. Radcliff said it was useless to refer the same as the way the house was conducted last Saturday was a disgrace to the city. Report unanimously sustained.

### Some Small Matters.

The city payroll for June were ordered paid. Greenbaum moved that city supply 15 to 20 loads of gravel North Twelfth street from D street north. Carried.

Stolz asked that fire department be granted the usual vacation of two weeks leave of absence, upon furnishing suitable substitutes.

Manager Page asked for extension of time to July 20 to finish work of relaying track on State street.

Petition of A. O. Damon and others for toilet for men and women in Marion square for the Cherry Fair. Laid on table.

Committee on health and police reported that certain ordinances were not enforced. Referred to same committee.

Stolz reported on need of repairing hand stand on Wilson avenue. Referred to committee on public parks.
