THE BUSINESS OUTLOOK.

Goodwin's Weekly says we look for better times.

We look to see in every morning's dispatch where some great manufacturing plant has resumed work, where more and more men are obtaining employment.

We think it will extend to the railroads, that the trains WHICH HAVE BEEN LYING IDLE ALL WINTER will all be running again within a month.

We rather expect that the stock exchange in New York will suddenly start up with irrefragable enthusiasm, because it will be to the interest of the men of money to have times prosperous from sea to sea on election day.

Then again, the crops WILL BEGIN TO YIELD THEIR RETURNS IN A FEW WEEKS and the men who deal in money and who have been quiet for the last eight months will pick up the tangled ends of their business and begin anew.

All the signs look hopeful, and when business is resumed in the east we look to see the metals begin to rise, especially copper, because there are a thousand electric power and railroad companies waiting an auspicious time to begin operation.

CALIFORNIAN BOOSTS. WILLAMETTE VALLEY

The following extract of a letter to the Fortuna, Cal., Beacon, from the pen of B. F. Cassidy, who recently visited this section, will prove of interest to our home readers:

"I have been the length of California and the San Joaquin and Sacramento are not in the swim compared with the Willamette valley for production. No irrigation here. Grain as far as the eye can see and then some. A well watered valley with millions of water power which are used already to a great extent in running woolen mills, grist mills, saw mills, chair factories, in fact, all industries carried on here and there's room for more. And there is also room for millions more people. Land is cheap, from \$10 to \$100 per acre with the best ranch improvements that I ever saw on the coast. Everybody looks well and happy and lives easily. I have not been over all the valley and I don't think I will get to see it all right away for I think it would take one a year or two to go over it all. I am going east to a nice town of 1500 inhabitants, milling town and a prosperous one also.

"All that is the matter with this country is it is in Oregon. A small family can make a living here on 25 acres. It is a fine fruit and berry country. Apples, pears, plums, evergreen blackberries grow along the roads and fence rows and you may find them among the oak and ash timber just doing fine although they are not pruned or cared for."

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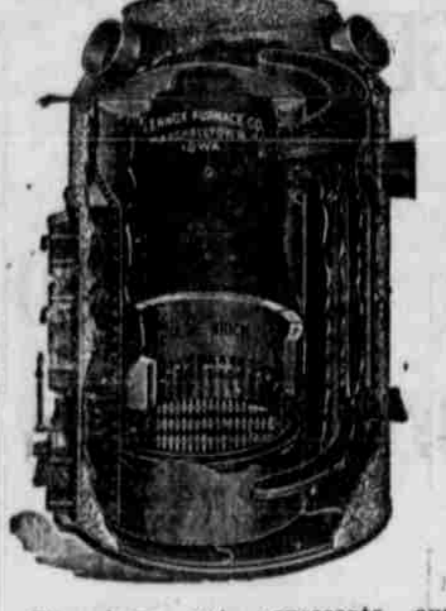
