LOGGING IN COLOMBIA TO BE UNDERTAKEN

Larger bodies of most excellent timber, carrying in addition to Spanish cedar and mahogany of the finest quality, many other valuable trees of beautiful grain, have been discovered in Colombia, and a great deal of timber is of easy access to the Magdalena river.

One of the main questions in the possible delivery of this timber at the seashore, as the delta proper of the Magdalena offers no facility therefor. Examination has recently been made of the "digue" by an English gentleman who has several options on a large tract of this timber, and he declares that it is possible to float or raft logs through it for at least eight months of the year.

This dique, which draws its main water supply from the Magdalena river at Calamar, is almost 190 miles long and quite tortuous for part of its distance, and is very much overgrown with wild hacinth, but recently the Cadoc, a screw steamer, forced its way the full length of the dique, and demonstrated that the waterway is open. The English gentleman referred to recently came through the dique and informed me that in his opinion logs can be easily handled therein for at least half the year, and usually eight months.

At periods when the dique might be closed to navigation logs could be loaded on the bar at Calamar or at Barranquilla, and thus taken alongside ship without delay. To make navigation of the dique feasible for steamers the entire year

would, without a doubt, be an expensive proposition, according to an American engineer who recently examined it with that end in view, but it would seem that to float logs through would not be difficult. If proved feasible, it will open up great bodies of valuable timber in the interior valleys of Colombia.

There is said to be a fair current through the dique during the six or eight months of high water when logs would float without much attention. At the other seasons—that is, of low water, it is believed that they could be towed through.

The dique empties into a deep gulf opening into the sea about seven miles south of Cartagena bay. This gulf is protected, and at almost any season ships could lie near the mouth of the canal or dique to load logs. Consular Report.

STATE NEWS.

MORE FOREST RANGERS FOR COAST RESERVES

The forest service has just announced the following appointments on national forests: James Tugate, forest guard on the Clater national forest, Oregon, or duty on the Klamath Indian reservation; Robert J. McCann, forest guard on the Deschutes national forest, Oregon; S. P. Arthur, forest guard on the Lemhi national forest, Idaho; Charles B. Mack, assistant forest ranger on the San Juan national forest, Colorado; James T. Cook, forest guard on the Prescott national forest, Arizona; Bernard Private, and J. E. Elliott, forest guards on the Stanislaus national forest, California.

The Cuirass, Old and New.

At present the showy cuirass which lingers in the British army is purely spectacular, a showy ingredient of the circus side of warfare.

Soldiers constantly assert that cuirasses will never be used again in actual fighting. They weigh seven or eight pounds, they cost £2 or £3, and they are not even proof against a revolver bullet, while, as against modern rifles, they might as well be made of brown paper.

Hence, as La France M'haile tells us, there was a strong movement in the French army in favor of abolishing cuirasses both for cuirasses and dogoos. But General de Gallifet offered strong resistance to this revolutionary reform, and the cuirass was saved.

It is doubtful whether even General de Gallifet would have been able to have arrested the abolition of the cuirass had it not been for the discovery to which I have already referred.

This was a discovery rather than an invention. Although its peculiar nature is shrouded in mystery, enough is known to give rise to very interesting speculations as to whether, instead of getting rid of armor altogether, we are not destined in the next few years to see the reappearance of mail-clad men in the ranks of war. The French government has for

some months past been making an exhaustive series of experiments as to the value of the new composition, and it is interesting to hear that he has practically decided that the inventor has made good his claims and that in the warfare of the future there is a new kind of armor devised to play a very important part.

This is not surprising if the claims of the inventor are really substantiated. It is asserted that the new material possesses four or five times as much resistance as chilled steel.

That it is practically invulnerable to rifle bullet; that it does not weigh any more than the existing cuirass; that it can be manufactured at half the price, and even if it should be pierced it can be made as good as new almost without any expenditure of time or material. Such assertions, incredible though they may appear, I have reason to believe are well within the facts.—W. T. Stead in London Chronicle.
