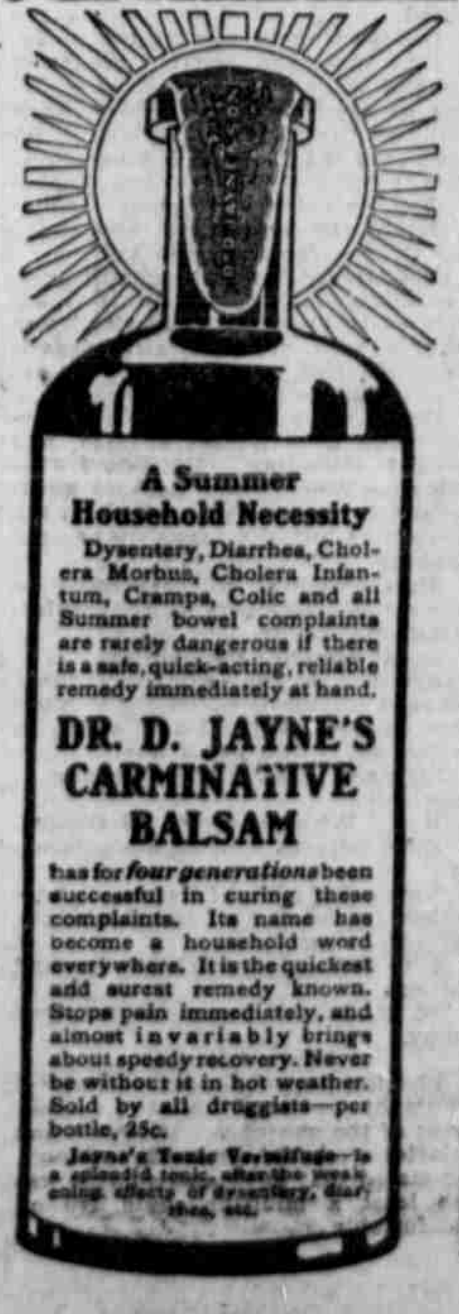

Whereas, it would seem to be a proper and desirable thing to preserve this old historic landmark as a sort of Methodist shrine, No doubt the citizens of Oregon City would be willing to furnish a suitable and eligible plot of ground on which to have this old structure and perhaps the church would be willing to dispose of it at a reasonable figure.

Resolved, that a committee of five be appointed with power to act to take this matter in charge. Said committee to be composed of the district superintendents, and the pastor of the Oregon City church.
