SETTLED NEAR **SALEM IN 1849**

(Roseburg Review, Nov. 11.) Rev. C. B. Marsters, on of Oregon's earliest ploneers and at one time a resident of Roseburg, died at his bome at Myrtle Point, Nov. 10, 1908, at the age of 80 years. Death was due to general debility. The funeral will be held at Myrtle Point Thursday.

Rev. Marsters emigrated to Oregon in 1849, first locating in the Waldo Hills, near Salem. After a short time he went to California and Liter came to Douglas county. He lived at Oakland for a time and then moved to Roseburg, settling on the present Godfrey place, abutting the west side of the river and now occupide by W. H. Lindsey. About 30years ago Rev. Marsters moved to Myrtle Point and never afterwards, changed his place of residence.

To Rev. Marsters is credited the distinction of introducing the Angora goats in this cetion of the state.

After his removal from Roseburg the business of raising such stock was continued extensively by one of his sons, L. A. Marsters, who died just ten months ago today. Rev. Marsters was connected with the United Brethren church, His surviving brother, Rev. E. M. Marsters, formerly of this city, now living at Silverton, is also a minister of that denomination, and in his 86th year. There also survives a sister, Mrs. L. C. Williams, a former resident of . West Roseburg, now residing in California; Rev. Marsters' second wite and the following children by his first wife, who died 24 years ago:

TO RAISE FUNDS

(Coos Bay Times.)

A movement for the united and systematic advertising of Coos county has been started by a number interested in the development of this section. It is proposed to have each city in the county contribute to a fund and the county commissioneds, also to defray a portion of the ex-

The matter was taken up with the county commissioners the other day by F. S. Dow of Marshfield, Orvil Dodge of Coquit'e, and J. O. Stemmler of Myrtle Point. The commissioners took the matter under con ideration and stated that if the towns of the county through their commercial organizations would raise a fund, the county would probably be able to contribute at the January session.

The size of the fund has not been determined. It is expected that Marshfield, North Bend, Bandon, Coquille and Myrtle Po'nt and perhaps some of the other towns will be able to raise \$2000 or \$2500 for the purpose and that the county will add \$1000 or so to it.

The fund so raised is to be used in various ways to advertise this section throughout the country. One of the principal ways will probably be the compflation of an illustrated pamphlet containing data on the agricultural, horticultural and commercial possibilities which will be distributed far and wide.


