## DE SAGAN GETS A NEW LAWYER

Paris, Dec. 9.—Prince Heile de Sagan, who recently married Anna Gould-De Castellane, angered at the alleged clumsy manner in which his case was presented today practically withdrew the case from the hands of Maître Clemenceau at the resumption of the suit of Count Bond de Castellane for the custody of his children.

M. Julie Mier appeared as chief counsel for de Sagan. Mier followed the tactics of Clemenceau in reviewing the details of the divorce trial of Bond and the then Countess Anna. He contended that de Sagan was too gentlemanly to drag into the case the names of women dishonorably involved with the count.

Mier averred that there had been nothing morally wrong in the life of de Sagan prior to his marriage.

One of the letters referred to was read by Mier. It was addressed to "Dear Zizzie," de Sagan's alleged mistress and said:

"I know nothing positive yet. She is a hard hatted belle. I need money at once and want you to go to the notary who lent me money before on the Vincennes house. I will be encouraged by the thought of the bag of gold I will get."

Another letter seeking a loan of 100,000 francs on ten per cent interest contained the words: "After the marriage with Anna."

A third missive declared "everything progressing satisfactorily at the Avenue Malakoff," referring to the residence of the countess.

## TO PROSECUTE BRUTAL DRIVER

Judge Moores received information yesterday to the effect that a teamster in charge of a span of mules, hauling gravel out of a pit near the Southern Pacific depot, unmercifully beat the animals for a half hour. A woman observed the outrageous act, while in her home near by. It cannot be learned as yet the name of the brutal driver, but the city officials have been instructed to locate him if possible, after which Judge Moores will issue a warrant for his arrest. From the testimony of several persons who witnessed the outrageous proceedings, the driver was attempting to force the animals to pull an overloaded wagon through the mire, and upon their inability to continue to beat them in a manner disgusting and beyond even common decency, until they were hardly able to move. In giving his view on the matter this morning, Judge Moores stated that he would punish the driver to the fullest extent of the law, if he can be brought before him. In order that the unfeeling person alleged to have taken undue advantage of his team can be informed of the state law covering this crime, the following insertions are taken from section 1943, laws of Oregon, as follows: "Whoever overdrives, overloads, drives when overloaded, overworks, torments or deprives of necessary sustenance, cruelly beats, mutilates, either as owner or have in his custody, a dumb animal, shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding 60 days or a fine of \$100, or both fine and imprisonment."
