SCHOOLS ARE LAX IN MORAL TRAINING

(United Press Leased Wire.)

New York, Jan. 29.—The need of a formative system of education for the irresponsible American youths in high school and college will be pointed out today by Col. R. E. Scott, commandant of the West Point Military Academy. Scott declared that the American system of education was based on the German system, but that the German universities accepted students whose habits and character were formed.

Colonel Scott lectured last night on the subject of the attitude of the student toward his law and citizenship. He said:

"The system is based largely on the German, without regard for the moral training of the student. This is going too far in the direction of liberality. The German student, as a rule, has had a military training earlier; there is no such training here. The freedom of the German system is for the man whose habits and character already have been formed."

"The American boy who has not had such formative training should have the character formed for him, and not left to his individual caprice. The nation greatly needs larger leaven of military discipline, such as West Point gives, to increase the respect for law and for the duties of citizenship, and I believe colleges ought to furnish it."

Now one judge who has a very small district is to be raised to four thousand dollars a year and the rest, except those at Portland are to be kept **ON A THREE THOUSAND DOLLAR SALARY.**

That is not fair. Four thousand a year would get better judges. They would try cases better. There should be less appeals.

MARION COUNTY SALARY BILLS.

The Marion county delegation has reached an agreement to raise the salary of the County Superintendent of Schools a small amount.

That seems to be all right, as school work is being extended, and **THE OFFICE HAS ACTUAL NEED OF A DEPUTY.**

The sheriff's office will get the same salary, and the same deputy hire, but it will be divided among three deputies.

The Sheriff will get \$2000 a year as now. The deputies will get \$1200 for first, \$950 for second, and \$720 for third. The Sheriff's office will have to collect \$500,000 taxes this year, and requires plenty of competent help.

No private business handles that amount of money on such small salaries and does all the other work required of that office.

The Marion county delegation has gone slow about creating new offices or increasing salaries.

The County Judge and Commissioners are the men **WHO OUGHT TO COME IN FOR A RAISE NEXT TIME.**

They transact more business for less pay than almost any men in the state.

But they are not asking for a raise so our county is to get off easy.

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MEXICO TO FORM GREAT MINING TRUST

City of Mexico, Jan. 29.—Plans are being prepared today for the incorporation of 60 mining properties throughout Mexico. Announcement of the plan was made by Pedro Alvarado, a multi-millionaire mine owner in the district of Chihuahua. His mines lie in the districts of Chihuahua, Durango, Guerrero and Coahuila.

The company will be known as the Alvarado Mining Company and will be incorporated under the laws of the state of New York. Several prominent American mining men will be interested in the merger.
