

CALIFORNIA SENATOR AGAINST THE S. P.

Yuma, Ariz., Oct. 13.—The orange and lemon growers of Southern California have raised a fund of \$50,000 to fight the Southern Pacific and other roads which, they say, are taking all their profits in exorbitant transportation charges.

Acting for the citrus growers in this fight, Senator Flint will, as soon as congress meets, introduce a bill prohibiting railroads from raising their rates without the consent of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

"I believe I can secure the passage of this bill," said Flint. "Even if I can't, I believe the orange and lemon growers can beat the railroads."

"The matter has already been brought into court, and we hope to get a restraining order of some sort prohibiting the recently increased rates from going into effect."

"The way the railroads have combined to ruin the farmers of Southern California is a burning shame. I do not believe that there are any railroads honestly competing against each other in the whole United States. They are all in a combination. I believed the death of Harriman settled competition as far as the people of the country is concerned."

"Now that he is gone the railroads of the entire country are controlled by the big bankers, mainly from the office of Kuhn, Loeb & Company, J. Pierpont Morgan & Company and the Vanderbilts. I believe that before Mr. Harriman died he called his lieutenant to him and instructed them to bring about the combination after he had passed away."

"The elections in the directorates of his roads since his death prove this."

DANIEL WEBSTER IS A SCRAPPER

Los Angeles, Oct. 13.—Dannie Webster, of Los Angeles, today is the possessor of Tom McCarey's bantamweight championship belt, and the world's bantamweight title, which he won from Monte Attell by a narrow margin on a newspaper decision.

After ten rounds of vicious hammer and tongs fighting at Naud Junction last night, both fighters were on their feet and going strong, but Webster had decidedly the best of the milling for eight rounds, but in the final two sessions the northern cut loose and bewildered the local boy by his lightning work.

The Hebrew's finish, many of the spectators averred, entitled him at least to a draw.

The dissenting scribes gave Attell a decision by a narrow margin, but the belt and the title, so far as local sports are concerned, belong to Webster.

Webster surprised even his staunchest admirers by his sterling work in the first eight rounds. He easily evaded Attell's rushes and more than held his own when Attell forced him in the in-fighting.

Attell apparently did not strike his stride until the ninth round arrived. During this period, and the final round, he smothered Webster, to the delight of the small contingent of San Francisco rooters in the pavilion.

It is probable that McCarty will try to match the boys for a return engagement in November.

FIVE MEN DROWNED UP AT SKAGWAY

Skagway, Alaska, Oct. 14.—Word was received here today of the drowning near Oren Shaw's roadhouse Monday afternoon by the overturning of a four-horse stage while crossing the Klehini river. The victims were Mike McNeil, driver; Quentin Grenshaw, John Nett, and two natives. Two other passengers, a white man and a native woman, were saved by clinging to the floating wagon box, and were rescued at a bridge some distance below.

Det. McNeil attempted to ford the river, which was swollen to above its normal height by recent rains, and the swift current swept the horses from their feet and overturned the stage.

Only one body, that of a native woman, was recovered.
