Winters, Calif., Jan. 27.—Four masked bandits who were barely prevented from raiding banks and business houses here after cutting all wires into the place and seizing a Southern Pacific locomotive are being sought today by detectives throughout this section of the state. The four had arranged for a big raid when a crowd which had been attending an entertainment at the Hermitage club, poured out into the street and scared them off. After cutting telegraph and telephone wires, the robbers visited the Southern Pacific roundhouse, captured and tied Watchman J. Brady and Joseph Lanne, a passer-by, and prepared the engine for flight. When frightened away the bandits stole a horse and buggy and fled.

SENATE SPENDS MORNING.

acquainted with it and placed him on the witness stand for cross-examination. Senator Carson retorted that he did not desire to undergo so severe a cross-examination by the learned senator of Portland and reminded him of the fact that the bill had been drawn by another distinguished gentleman of Portland. That brought Judge Lionel Webster to the floor and it was then that it developed that some one had blundered—that sections belonging to the state prison convict bill passed yesterday had been injected into it and that but a portion of Senator Carson's original bill remained. Just who was responsible for the blunder, whether the state printer or the clerk of the senate was not determined at noon, but that it is one of them is certain. The bill was then referred back to the committee and ordered reprinted.

Becomes Involved in Talk. The senate then proceeded to the consideration of a bill introduced by Senator Barrett, of Umatilla county, and which authorizes county to issue bonds for the building of roads. Like yesterday there was a flood of amendments and an incessant chatter upon them, and when the senate adjourned at noon, it was still amending and still chattering. The bill provides that when a petition containing signatures equal to one-fourth of the vote cast for certain officers at the last general election shall ask a county court to hold a special election for the issuance of bonds that the court shall call it.

Farmer Stirrs Them Up. Just before the noon hour the senate listened to a talk by Mr. Mason, a farmer of Hood River, on the bill. He objected, not only to some features of it, but the bill as a whole and said that there was a substitute bill in the house which the farmers and

grangers favored over it. He scored Senator Barrett for having asserted that the grangers and farmers were back of his bill, maintaining that they were not.

His speech riled the senate and brought Senator Selling to his feet with the remark that he was becoming tired of obstructionists and that if the policy was continued, he would be compelled to vote against the good road measures. Mason had also charged the senators with wanting to build a north and south highway and Selling took exceptions to that and also reprimanded him for not having confidence in the county courts. That started a general wrangle which lasted until Senator Selling moved that the committee arise and report progress, but just on what seemed uncertain, unless it was in the line of talk.

To Visit Corvallis.

The senate this morning accepted an invitation from the management of the Oregon Agricultural College to visit that institution Friday.

A resolution introduced in the senate and passed by the house with amendments and providing for an amendment to the constitution creating the office of lieutenant governor was concurred in.

Two of Senator Oliver's bills—one relating to the qualification of judges and the other in regard to conclusive presumptions in law were killed by the committee. A similar fate fell to a bill of Senator Joseph relating to tax liens and one of Senator Malarkoy to invest the state board of health with the duties of dairy and food commissioner.
