NO LIVES WERE LOST IN WRECK

Seattle, Wash., Jan. 27.—A wireless message received here at noon stated that the missing boat with 12 passengers and members of the crew of the wrecked steamer Cottage City, has been accounted for and all are safe. The commanding officer of the government rescue ship Snohomish reports the weather as cloudy and northerly winds. It is hoped that the steamer can be pulled off the reef of Cape Mudge where she grounded during a blizzard yesterday.

The vessel struck the hidden rocks near the entrance of Seymour Narrows during a blinding snowstorm late yesterday afternoon. The steamer was running half speed ahead when she struck the rocks with a terrific jar.

NEW TARIFF PLEASES THE CANADIANS

Toronto, Ont., Jan. 27.—The Globe, Canada's chief government organ, discussing the proposed reciprocity treaty with the United States, today says: "The proposed agreement is distinctly popular in Canada. If the cry of the American people for a wider source for a food supply is genuine, it will be equally popular in the United States."

"Whether congress ratifies the agreement or not, it will stand as a convincing proof of the desire of both governments to end tariff wars and bring about more neighborly consideration. Friendship and fair dealing is far better than strife and suspicion. Ministers Fielding and Patterson have shown that the good relations with the United States are consistent with unwavering loyalty to Canada. The British preferential tariff is the keynote of Canada's fiscal policy."

THE YANKEE FISHERMEN AGAINST IT

Gloucester, Mass., Jan. 27.—Designed as a protest against a reciprocity treaty with Canada, the flags of the big New England fishing fleet are floating today at half-mast with unions down, and the backers of the industry are planning a bitter fight in congress against the industry.

It is believed that the entire fishing interests of the country will support the fight, and telegrams are pouring in pledging aid.

A committee of the fishing interests was appointed today to act in Washington with similar committees representing the Atlantic and Pacific cod, mackerel and salmon fisheries in opposing ratifications by congress.

BARRY RESIGNED FOR GOOD OF THE SERVICE

Washington, Jan. 27.—By order of President Taft and Secretary of the Navy Meyer, Rear Admiral Edward B. Barry today resigned "for the good of the service."

Barry's resignation is effective immediately. He will be entirely separated from the government service and loses both his rank and all pay.
